I want H. A. Wedding, George W. Wedding and Joseph H. Wedding, each to have a cow out of my cattle more than any of the other children as I have give one to each of all the rest of my children. And I want my land and the balance of my property to be equally divided among my children.

I also want the said Martha E. Morgan to have fire wood off my land her lifetime or as long as she conduct herself right, this being my last Will and Testament.
