Bell of Ohio County Kentucky do make and ordain this to be my last will & testament & I do hereby expressly revoke acc other wills ever made by me 1st I hold a Mortgage dated March 27th 1871 from B. B. Frelinger on a tract of land known & called the Knob-hick tract containing 127 acres to secure a Note of \$761.86 and I devise the said Note & Mortgage to my Grand Son George Frelinger & my Grand Daughter Mary E. Whittingham 2nd I own an interest in certain lands in Grayson County held in the name of H. M. Henry & in certain Notes for the sale of part of said land which said land & Notes are in the contract of said M. Henry & I devise him to their contract the same as him may seem best & I will that after the payment of my just debts & liabilities out said land & Notes that my Executor pay to my Daughter Ellenor Frelinger the sum of One hundred dollars to each of the Children of my Daughter Mary Rebecca Ashley ten dollars each to the remainder of the same to be paid & divided Equally among the Children of my Daughter Catherine Thompson if however the surplus should exceed \$2000⁰⁰ then I devise the excess over said sum to be divided one half to my Daughter Ellenor Frelinger & one half to said Children of Catherine Thompson 3rd I give my morn to my Daughter Ellenor Frelinger & I also give her the use of my furniture such as is not specifically devised & at her death to be divided between her Children George & Mary E. Whittingham 4th I give my Ledgeboard to George Frelinger & my bed & bedding & cloths to Mary E. Whittingham & I give my Silver ware to my Great Grand Daughter Mary B. Whittingham 5th I give my watch to George B. Thompson my Grand Son, I give my saddle to my Grand Son James Frelinger & I also hold on him certain Notes which I hereby release & devise to him, Lastly I appoint my friend H. M. Henry my Executor & I request that no surety shall be required of him & I request my Executor out of the Grayson County land & Notes to purchase tombstones for my self my wife & my Son George

Beal deceased dated July 9th 1876 together with the Codicils of date July 27 1876 and July 31 1876 were at this Term of said Court produced and were duly proved by the oath of Henry D. McHenry James Gallenger & David Whittinghree and John E. Vice subscribing witnesses thereto and the James Gallenger also made oath as to the attestation of George B. Gallenger also a subscribing witness and the said will and Codicil being examined by the Court were approved and ordered to be recorded which has been done together with this Certificate

In the name of God Amen I Fielding Lewis of Hotelobacca County in the Parish of Saint George being indisposed and knowing there is a time for all flesh to die do make and declare this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say first I bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God my blessed Creator trusting and believing a redemption of my sins thro the merits and mediation of my Saviour Jesus Christ. My body I commit to the earth to be interred at the discretion of my Executors here after named and as to all my worldly estate which it has pleased God to bless me with I devise as follows In primis I give to my loving wife Betty Lewis during her life in use of all my lands in Hotelobacca County (except that part which my son John has parted during my said wifes life as will appear by a writing passed for that purpose and all the lots in the Town of Fredericksburg) I also give to my said wife for her living negroes (viz) five men and five women with the flocks of Cattle Sheep and horses Carriages Plate and household furniture with eight of the house servants with their children that are not above twelve years old Each of them as she shall choose also the negro woman Harry the above in use of her son. Then I give to my son John Lewis after the death of his mother all my lands in Hotelobacca County and in the Town of Fredericksburg also one sixth part of all my negroes including those mine already given him also my gold watch and the silver cup which was his Mothers that has a race horse and ground thereon. It is my intention that he have immediate possession of all my lots in the Town of Fredericksburg except my back to one house which I give to my living wife and after her death to my son When the above is given in consideration that my son John Lewis pays fifteen hundred pounds sterling towards the payment of my debts but if my son John should refuse to pay the said money then my will is that all the land between the road leading from Fredericksburg to the Falls and the River and all my lots in the Town of Fredericksburg or so much thereof as he shall in case raise the said fifteen hundred pounds sterling Then I give to my son Fielding Lewis one thousand acres of my Frederick County land on which he lives as surveyed by Mr Berry with one sixth part of all my negroes including the thirteen he has already received to him and his heirs forever Then I give to my son George Lewis all the remainder of my tract of land in Frederick County bought of Robert Carter Nicholas Esqr except one thousand acres which I shall hereafter devise to my son Lawrence Lewis and was surveyed by Mr Berry with one sixth part of all my negroes including the thirteen already given to him & his heirs forever Then I give to Charles Carter Esqr my son in law the negro branch Quity and her children and the girl Mickey now in the house which my Daughter Cates her maid also five hundred pounds special with interest from the 7th day of May 1781 and for which I have passed my note to him. Then I give to my son Lawrence Lewis one thousand acres of land in the County of Frederick on which my daughter Butler now lives as surveyed by Mr Berry with one sixth part of all my negroes reckoning those above mentioned to have been given to my sons John Fielding & George also one third part of all my flocks of horses Cattle Sheep and hogs in the plantation I hold there
