I give to my nephew Roman Holbrook my bay Mare, Bird - my bureau, my small single bedstead, Spring mattress, be pillow and covering to match - My side saddle to Martha Holbrook - My eight hogs are to be equally divided between my Brother John B. and Richard A. and my Sister Martha Holbrook.

My clock I give to Martha J. Roman and give to Elvira Piller; and my large bedstead to John B. Roman - My other bed covering to be equally divided if not disposed of by me before, between Martha Holbrook, Elvira Piller, Martha J. Roman and Martha L. Roman.

My small trunk I give to my Martha Holbrook, and large trunk to my nephew Robert A. Roman. My China dishes, cups, &c. Martha Holbrook - My dining table to Elvira Piller. The set of teaspoons, silver from my mother I give Martha Holbrook. The set of silver from Livingston to Martha J. Roman; the remaining set to Martha L. Roman. My wash bowl and pitcher to Elvira Piller. Any remaining things I may have overlooked I give my sister Martha Holbrook except my small clock I give to my nephew Andrew A. Roman and my large feather bed and covering to match to Malinda Roman of color in consideration of her kindness to me.

I give to Elizabeth Woodman for use and benefit of my sister M. A. Woodman's deaf children, to my sister Mary L. Ball to my sister L. M. Samson, and to my brother H. C. Roman each, and declare to be paid to them by my Executor on the final settlement of my estate.
