In the third place it is my desire that my share I have the privilege of showing this home among my children & the one whom I wish to go take him at the off account. I also wish all my lands sold but as to what time and manner of sale I have discretion as with my Executors and the proceeds divided among my children as before mentioned. It is not my desire or will that my son Christopher and Benjamin should receive any additional amounts and have already gone to them in hand and also proper an amount above that which will likely come to my daughters under the foregoing provisions of this my last Will and testament. I do hereby ordain and appoint my son in law Anna F. Austin and William H. Miller my Executors and hereby request them to act as such and carry into effect this my last Will and testament with as little delay, cost and trouble as may be practicable, and now after mature deliberation do ordain this my last will and testament.
