 carry out the provisions of the foregoing will;
 also, constitute and appoint the said James
 M. McLanahan to be the Guardian of the two
 children, William Henry, & Benjamin Gellam, and
 fourthly, and lastly I now resign my soul to
 God who gave it Amen.
