I Richard Turner, being sound in mind although far advanced in years and much debilitated in body, do declare this my last will and testimony. My first ^{request} is that my executors collect all the debts that may be found due me on my decease, and that they, out of such collections, if any, pay all my legal debts; if they be not sufficient, then sale of my personal property sufficient to defray those debts, together with my funeral and other contingent expenses. Secondly I bequeath to my daughter Elisabeth Marshall all and every thing both personal and real; that I may die possessed of, or in other words she is to have the use and control of it during her natural life, and at her death any thing that may remain as to personal property together with the real estate, shall be equally divided amongst my legal heirs or assigns, that is to say Elisabeth Marshall's children one fourth, Mary Martin or children one fourth, Reuben Turner or children one fourth, and Smith Turner or children the other fourth as the case may be. I further say that Reuben Turner his heirs or assigns, shall hold peaceable possession of the land which he now occupies, and was surveyed to him with my consent on day of , containing ¹ acres forever. Further it is my wish that my worthy friends Mr Henry Antle, Mr Isaac Wright, and James Duncan Esqrs. duly serve as my executors, and see that that this my last will be truly executed, In token of my sincerity

in executing this my last will and testament, I have caused my name to be written, to which I set my mark in the presents of the annexed signing witnesses this 25th of August 1827
