 body and knowing that it is appointed for all men
 and to do so make and ordain this my last
 Will and Testament
 Now I commit my soul into the hands of God my
 Creator and my body to the dust from whence it came
 and as touching such worldly estate as it has pleased
 God to Bless me with in this life I give and dispose of in the
 following manner viz^t
 Now I give and bequeath to my loving wife Hannah all that
 part of the tract of land on which I now live which will lie
 West of a line Beginning at John Wells South West Corner
 And running thence a Due South Course untill it intersects my
 South line to have and to hold during her natural life
 as widow hood also four Negroes To wit Joe, Minney, Simon
 and Charles during her natural life as widow hood also
 two thirds of all my Stocks of Horses Cattle sheep and
 Hops and all my house hold and Kitchen furniture

together with all my farming utensils (except such articles as my wife may think she will not stand in need of) but if my wife should marry it is my wish that the property above mentioned be taken by my Executors hereinafter mentioned and disposed of as the balance of my estate as herein after directed by giving her one child's part of my estate during her natural life.

I then I give and bequeath to my Daughter Rebecca (Middleton) my Negro Woman Cely to be considered as three hundred and twenty Dollars of her proportionable part of my estate. I then as my son-in-law James Middleton has made a considerable improvement on the East End of my tract of land it is my wish that my Executors (hereinafter named) lay off to him as much land as a parallel line with my East line to be run so ~~near~~ as to include his farm will include all that end of the tract and that there be three Commissioners appointed by the County Court to value said land as though it was now in woods and that he have the same at said valuation by paying to ^{the} Executors. (for the benefit of my heirs) any sum that it may amount to over his proportionable part ^{of my estate} that is now to be distributed amongst my heirs and that he have the same credit extended to him as to other purchases ^{had} I then I leave the balance of my estate not before disposed of both real and personal to be sold by my Executors hereinafter mentioned in any way that they may think most advantageous to the heirs and the money arising from the sale to be divided in the following manner. Verly

I wish my Daughters Rachel, Polly, Sally, Patience and Hester to receive as much as my Daughters that are married have rec^d of my estate and when they have received as much as may be equal to that which their married sisters have had (exclusion of such articles as they have made for themselves which their mother will distribute amongst them as she thinks proper) then I wish the balance to be equally divided between all my children giving my daughter Polly one equal part with ^{the} rest of my children including the legacy before mentioned and should the said sum laid off to James Middleton not amount to his proportionable part said sum to be made equal to the rest as I wish all my children to have an equal part and at the death of my wife I wish that part of my estate which is left to her to be sold and the money arising from the sale to be equally divided between all my children. I then I do hereby declare and appoint my loving wife Ann and my son-in-law James Middleton to execute

this my last will and Testament I give under my hand and seals this 14th day of June in the Year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and fifty.

I Jane Venable of the County of Shelby and State of Kentucky being of sound Mind and Correct Memory but in a State of sickness and knowing that it is appointed to all human beings once to die to prevent any Confusion respecting my property after my decease I make the following disposition of all my worldly goods viz. (1) I order that all my funeral expenses and just Debts to be paid out of my estate by my executor hereinafter named My Nephew Joseph Venable should be paid for his medical services to me out of a sum for which I hold his note and the balance of said sum I bequeath unto my said Nephew - (2) I give and bequeath to my Brother James my three negroes viz. Henry, Sam and Louis and desire to have and to hold the same forever (3) I give and bequeath to Samuel Mahan my Nephew and One hundred Dollars and one hundred Dollars to each of my Nieces Polly Mahan and Fann Mahan and also one hundred Dollars to my Niece Judith Venable so soon as a sufficient quantity of Money would be due to me according to my father's will (4) I give and bequeath the balance of the money which would fall to me out of the property real and personal now in my Mother's Possession to my Sister Martha Harbison and my sister Frances Robinson's son James and Daughter are as follows viz. Five hundred Dollars to Martha Harbison and three hundred Dollars to said Martha my said Nephew & Niece James and Ann Robinson or agreeably to the said proportion be the same more or less and the three hundred Dollars to be equally divided between said James & Ann Robinson My other Property consisting of a mare saddle Bridle, bed
