In the name of God Amen
I James M Campbell of the County of Shelby
and Commonwealth of Kentucky being at this
well return in a weak and low state of health but of
sound mind and memory blessed be God for
his mercies but calling to mind the mortality of
my body and knowing that it is appointed unto man
once to die I do now make and Ordain this as
my last will and testament that in the first
place when it shall please God to call me
I resign my soul to God that gave me my body
to the Earth from whence it came to be buried in
a Christian like decent manner at the direction
of my Executor nothing doubting but by and through
the Almighty power of God to raise it again at
the resurrection And as to my Worldly Estate
with which it has pleased God to bless me both
while in this life I do will bequeath and dispose
of in the manner following (to wit) In the first
place I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved
wife Martha M Campbell the full firm and
uninterrupted possession of Mansion house furniture
stock and profits thereto belonging during her natural
life for her own use and benefit and support of
Children under her Charge Not all lawful just
debts discharged And to my son James M Campbell
I give and bequeath the tract of land between the
new line containing 250 acres To my

John McCampbell I give and bequeath the
 tract of land where he now lives containing
 200 Acres with this restriction that after his
 brother Washington McCampbell comes of age
 and his need may require him the said John
 McCampbell shall be bound to pay him One
 hundred pounds. To my son William McCamp-
 bell I give and bequeath my plantation
 formerly laid out lying on Hickory run contain-
 ing 200 Acres with this restriction that at a
 convenient time after his brother Samuel
 McCampbell comes of age he the said John
 McCampbell shall be bound to pay him One
 hundred pounds. To my son Andrew McCampbell
 I give and bequeath the plantation my present
 place of residence containing 200 Acres after
 the death of his mother. To my daughter Margaret
 McCampbell I give and bequeath the young
 wood man and saddle. And whenever she shall
 marry and remove her residence she is to have
 One feather bed with its furniture two Chairs &
 one iron as her brother can furnish her from the
 home place is also to have a Dressing Room which
 was the my House and to have a Dressing Room I
 bequeath fifty pounds to be paid twenty five
 pounds from the home plantation & twenty five
 by John McCampbell which payments are to be
 made as and as is convenient. To my daughter
 Nancy Elliott I give and bequeath a large
 parcel of land then belonging to her. And
 I bequeath five

that business or until my son An^o Mc Campbell
shall arrive to the age of twenty one And should
my son Andrew may choose to go to Education
with all of the plantation that may be necessary
and the plantation be allocated to the said
Geo. W. Mc Campbell for his paying the

his Education and that to be done before
 before he may come of age And that
 my Books for to be delivered my wife
 Martha McCampbell and the whole of
 the children as they may grow among them-
 selves In Testimony thereof I have
 set my hand and seal this 29th day of
 June 1804

The last Will and Testament of James
 McCampbell deceased together with the Book
 there annexed was produced into Court and
 proved by the Oaths of David Colgan and
 Andrew McCampbell two of the subscribers
 Witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded

Whereupon on Motion of James M.C.
 Campbell and James McCampbell the two
 Executors therein named who having made
 Oath as the Law directs and entered into
 Bond with Thomas Good & David Colgan
 their securities in the penalty of £4000
 Certificates is granted them for Obtaining
 probate thereof in due form
