

"Waring lived with wife Bucks in Versailles from the summer 1810 until a few days ^{or weeks} before his death which was in July 1812 during which time they furnished him his board and cloathing to Elizabeth W Waring (now Berryman) lived with William Shorthley and Mrs Shorthley (or nearly so) until her marriage with Berryman which your commissioners beg leave to refer to the court to say if any allowance should be allowed to these Legates (or any part of them) to say from evidence adduced to them what it should be your commissioners will venture to remark that the will of Thomas R Waring left the whole of the estate to his wife during her lifetime and out of the profits of the estate his children before named were to be supported educated &c and that Lucy Waring previous to her intermarriage with William Shorthley made a deed of gift to her three children before named of one moiety of the Estate when they became of age or married but reserves the use of this moiety to her use to maintain and educate the children as directed in her husband's will which your commissioners beg leave to refer the court to this will and deed of gift this your commissioners conceive leaves some doubts whether it is not necessary to have a legal adjudication to establish some principle which would guide us in making out some account. If such be necessary there is two points presents themselves to us which we would wish to have the direction of the court. 1st whether under the Deed of gift made by Mrs Waring (now Shorthley) the

moieties named was expressly set apart by her for her children before named support to and if so if any surplus how much it was and to whom it belongs 2nd whether under the will or gift either of the legates leaving the house of William Shorthley as guardian without being forbid therefrom whether they can legally call on the guardian or adm^r for a support elsewhere these principles being explained and set forth by the court your commissioners have objections to act and report accordingly Woodford County Oct

I James Lamkin of the county of Woodford and commonwealth of Kentucky being in perfect health and sound memory considering the certainty of death and the uncertainty of the time it may happen have determined to make this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say first I gave my soul to god that gave it to me and my body to be buried at the discretion of Executors I give my wife Sarah Lamkin all my land in Woodford county and all negroes during her natural life or widowhood to wit Dick Lucy and their four children and at her death or marriage disposed in the following manner my land on the south of Clear

28 my son Charles Harrison straight up south of east
to Sanuary's line my other land on the north
side of the said creek to be laid off in three equal
divisions my son William Murre to have the
lower part and my son Presley Thornton to have
the middle part together with the mansion house
my son Lewis Washington to have the upper
part eastward to be laid off equal for quantity
and the six negroes at my wife's death or marriage
to be given as follows item to my son John Lankin
a negro girl Rachel item to my son Charles
Harrison Isabella to my son William Murre eleven
to my son Presley Thornton shoes to my son
Lewis Washington Lucy the stooker
of the children to my son Peter Lankin if
living deck or the value of Deck if he wants
to stay with his wife in cash my son Peter
to have his choice of all my horses except what
I give to my wife and what given may to my
other sons before I give my wife also four horses
viz dimont Blitty Damon green the waggon and
my plantation utensils and all the rest of my
stock of cattle sheep and hogs and household and
kitchen furniture but one bed for my daughter
Charlotte Leasing so long as my wife lives at her
death all my personal estate to be equally divided
between my five youngest sons Item I give to
my Daughter Sally Parker one negro girl Susan
to the said Sally and to her heirs lawfully begot-
ten of her body to be received at my death as
also all the following legacies Item I give to my
Daughter Betsey Pepper one negro woman
named Sofia to and her heirs lawfully

begotten of her body Item I give to my Daughter
Fanny Hayes one negro woman named Sarah
to her and her heirs lawfully begotten of her body
Item I give son George Latham one negro man
Leve and one colt called Valliant Item I give to

Ordered to record whereupon Charles H Lambin and Sarah Lambin two of the executors therein named came into court and took the oath prescribed by law and executed and acknowledged bond in the penalty of \$11000 with Ephraim Jann - ary Robert Black and John Scott their sureties conditioned according to law Probate is thereupon granted in due form of law with leave for the other Executor to qualify.
