In Pursuance of an order of the Woodford County Court held at the November Term 1812 we George McDaniel Plebuch and William Alvord have proceeded to settle with Lucy Waring now Lucy Shreshley as administratrix of William Shreshley deceased whowas guardian of John Waring Robert W Waring and Elizabeth W Waring (now Berryman) and after examining Mrs Lucy Shreshley as administratrix and find no particular aces has ever been kept against said Legatee by either administratrix or guardian with respect to their support maintenance &c Your commissioners can find no correct Dattes to form an opinion they will briefly state the facts as near as they can that it appears that John Waring left William Shreshley his guardian in December 1805 and lived the most of his time with Mark

"Waring lived with wife Bucks in Viridley from the summer 1810 until a few days ^{or weeks} before his death which was in July 1812 during which time they furnished him his board and cloathing to Elizabeth W Waring (now Berryman) lived with William Shorsley and ~~not~~ Shorsley (or nearly so) until her marriage with Berryman which your commissioners beg leave to refer to the court to say if any allowance should be allowed to these Legates (or any part of them) to say from evidence adduced to them what it should be your commissioners will venture to remark that the will of Thomas R Waring left the whole of the estate to his wife during her lifetime and out of the profits of the estate his children before named were to be supported educated &c and that Lucy Waring previous to her intermarriage with William Shorsley made a deed of gift to her three children before named of one moiety of the Estate when they became of age or married but reserves the use of this moiety to her use to maintain and educate the children as directed in her husband's will which your commissioners beg leave to refer the court to this will and deed of gift this your commissioners conceive leaves some doubts whether it is not necessary to have a legal adjudication to establish some principle which would guide us in making out some account. If such be necessary there is two points presents themselves to us which we would wish to have the direction of the court. 1st whether under the deed of gift made by ~~not~~ Waring (now Shorsley) the

moieties named was expressly set apart by her for her children before named support to and if so if any surplus how much it was and to whom it belongs 2nd whether under the will or gift either of the legates leaving the house of William Shorsley as guardian without being forbid therefrom whether they can legally call on the guardian or adm^r for a support elsewhere these principles being explained and set forth by the court your commissioners have objections to act and report accordingly Woodford County Oct

In obedience to an Order of the honorable county Court for the said County made at their December Term 1812 appointing and directing us as commissioners to appraise the slaves and other personal Estate of John Lee deceased and allot to Lyddall Wilkinson who has intermarried with Elizabeth T. Lee one of the heirs of the said Decedant the portion of said estate devised to her by said Decedant's will and to make report to the next Court we James Coleman George Carlisle and Andrew Hamilton three of the said commissioners report as follows (viz)
That we met at the house of the said John Lee widow of John Lee deceased on the above date and appraised the slaves and other personal property belonging to the said estate which was produced to us by the said Elizabeth Lee his Executrix and Caleb Wallace one of the Executors we being duly sworn proceeded to divide the said slaves and other personal property into five equal Lots as nearly as circumstances would permit the slaves 25 in number we valued at \$7508.83 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents The horse kind seven in number we valued at \$335 The horned cattle sixteen in number we valued at \$170 Then the said Elizabeth T. Wilkinson drew by Lot the following negroes George Cate miney Aggy Comfy and James amounting
