

Bullitt (bul'it), **Alexander Scott**. b. at Dumfries, Va., 1762; d. April 13, 1816. American lieutenant governor and Kentucky pioneer, for whom Bullitt County in that state is named. After serving briefly (1783) in the Virginia House of Delegates, he moved to Kentucky, settling in Shelby County, and later in Jefferson County. He served as county lieutenant (1786) of Jefferson County, and was appointed (1787) a trustee of Louisville. He was a member (1788) of the convention for Kentucky statehood, and a member (1792) of the convention which drafted the state's first constitution. He served in the state senate, and was lieutenant governor from 1800 to 1804. *Century Cyclopedia of Names*, v. 1, by Clarence L. Barnhart (1904).

Bullitt, Henry Massie. b. in Shelby County, Ky., Feb. 28, 1817; d. at Louisville, Ky., Feb. 5, 1880. American physician and teacher. Graduated (1838) from the University of Pennsylvania, he was a professor (1846-48) at the St. Louis Medical College, and was appointed (1849) professor of materia medica at Transylvania University. In 1850 he founded the Kentucky School of Medicine at Louisville, and in 1868 founded the Louisville Medical College, with which he was associated until he died. Both of these institutions have since become part of the University of Louisville.
