married John's brothers, Russell and Clark T.) along with their families were members of the church

By 1840, Russell, Clark, Sarah and James Cockburn (a nephew or cousin) along with their in-laws, the Carrolls, were established along the old Federal Road in what is now Cisco in northern Murray County. Deed records show that land transactions by them started in 1834. Marriage records show that Clark, his sister Sarah, and James Cockburn were married in Murray County.

John Cockburn married Nancy Gage, Aug. 11, 1846 in Murray County. This was about the time of his brother George's death in Forsyth County. His will was probated in 1847. John probably lived with his bachelor brother until his death. George apparently also had a close relationship with John's in-laws, the Gage family, having left them land in Murray County in his will, John acquired his land in Murray County from his brother Russell.

Nancy Gage (b. 1820, d. 1904) was the daughter of Jacob and Sarah Gage, born in Rutherford County, N.C. In the 1880 census, she lists her father's place of birth as N.C. and her mother's place of birth as S.C. It has been passed down through the family that she was part Catawba Indian (a South Carolina tribe).

By the 1850 census, John and Nancy Gage Cockburn were the only Cockburns remaining in Murray County. Clark T., Russell and their families and inlaws the Carrolls had moved to Montgomery County in the Ozark mountains of western Arkansas. At the same time another of John's brothers, Jeremiah, was helping found Parker County, Texas (just west of Ft. Worth). Brother James was in Forsyth County and brother Archibald was in Cherokee County in Georgia.

John and Nancy Gage Cockburn reared seven children at Cisco: Columbus "Lum" (1848-1885), Mary Elvira "Ciss" (1850-1941), John (1853-1941), Jane (1854-1905), Monteville Cicero "Mont" (1857-1941), D.E. "Doc" (1860-1910) and Jefferson "Jeff" (1862-1946).

Other than a few family stories, little is known about the early years of John and Nancy and their family. It was passed down that during the Civil War when the activity in and around Dalton was occurring that Nancy had more than one confrontation with foraging soldiers. She blinded the mules to avoid having them taken, but they managed to take her horse which she was able to reacquire at gunpoint. They hid their livestock in the woods some distance from their house. At least on one occasion their house was ransacked for food and household wares.

It has been said that Nancy rarely missed church and rode a horse side-saddle to Liberty Baptist Church at Tennga even into her eighties. (John, Nancy, Nancy Jane, Ciss, John and Jeff are buried at Liberty. Mont and Doc are buried at Mt. Shumac Baptist at Cisco.)

Another family story relates that as young adults, Mont, Ciss and Jeff traveled to Arkansas and Texas to visit their relatives. They returned by ox-cart with a lifetime of tales about their experiences.

Ciss operated a small store a short distance north of Highway 2 on 411 Hwy. during the construction of the railroad in 1904 and 1905. A family speculation is that Cisco was named for her. Considering that her nickname was spelled C-i-s-s and her last name was pronounced Coburn, she and her family owned most of the property, and Cisco acquired its name about this time, it makes sense.

John, Ciss and Mont died within 10 days of each other in February of 1941. Of John and Nancy's seven children, only three, Lum, Mont and Doc had families of their own.

Columbus married Saphronia Shields. Their children were German, Jerry

Mar, Alsie, Nora and Negoshia.

Mont married Minnie Ella Decker. Their children were Lula Jane, John Richard, William Walter, Lela, Cecil Park, George Lester, Earnel Hazel, Augusta, Lee and Elmer. (See next family history.)

Doc married Lula Hartley. Their children were Luther, Charlie, Harlin,

Beautrice and Willie Mae.

The next generation numbers over 100 and most of their families live in Murray and Whitfield Counties today.

The Monteville Cicero "Mont" Cockburn Family

Monteville Cicero "Mont" Cockburn (b. 3-21-1857, d. 2-25-1941), son of John and Nancy Gage Cockburn, was married to Minnie Ella Decker (b. 7-22-1872 Ark., d. 1-17-1938 Ga.). Mont met Ella when he went to Arkansas to visit his uncles who had moved there. This was about 1887-1888 because she was 15 when married. Ella was the only child of Charlie Richard Decker and Lula Carpenter (b. 8-15-1850, d. 8-15-1935) who were from Texas. Lula's father was T.L. Carpenter and her mother was an Adams, also from Texas. Richard Decker died when Ella was young, and her mother, Lula Carpenter Decker, married again to William Steele and then to S.D. Elliott. She had six children by each of these husbands, Mont and Ella were the parents of:

The Webster Riley and John William Coffey Family - 1984

From authentic records of Georgia and family members.

Religious persecution caused Scotch Irish people to come to America by shiploads from 1700 to 1770. Coffeys were listed with those who arrived August 12, 1722. Some landed in Pennsylvania, others in South Carolina. Finding themserves unwelcome, those in the South went northward into West Virginia. Those

in Pennsylvania came southward to meet those in Virginia. From 1722 to 1832 there are many Coffeys listed in Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina and South Carolina, some given names being Rice, James, John, Jefferson, Lewis, Joel, Elisha, Edward, Webster and William. The 1850 Murray County, Georgia Census, Center Valley District, lists:

(I.) Ira Coffey, age 32, born in South Carolina, and Jane, his wife, born in South Carolina, also Ira and Jane's children, Susan, 5 and James T., age 3.

(II.) Joel Coffey, age 43, born in North Carolina. Wife Nancy, age 43, born in North Carolina.

(III.) Elijah Coffey and his wife Nancy, their sons William N. and A.A.

(IV.) Webster Coffey, 40, born in North Carolina and his wife Laura Ann Young, 36, born in South Carolina, and children born in Georgia: (1) Lilly 20; (2) James L. 18; (3) Edward N. 16; (4) Webster Riley 14; (5) Elizabeth 12; (6) John William 10; (7) Georgia 3; and (8) Gilbert 2.

Webster Riley, the fourth child and John William, the sixth child, lived and reared their families on farms between Eton, Georgia, and Center Valley in Murray County, and are buried on the north side of Center Valley Cemetery.
