### The Julius Deweese Family

Sometime between the years 1872 and 1878, Julius Deweese, a Civil War veteran, and his wife, Angeline (Drennon) Deweese, moved with their children from Macon County, N.C., to the Doolittle District of Murray County. His elderly parents, Henry and Elizabeth, also came with them. Their children were Virginia, Vollie and Theodosia.

Henry and Elizabeth were born in 1800 in N.C. His parents were born in Virginia. Elizabeth's father came from Baden, Germany; her mother was born in N.C.

Julius, following in his father's footsteps, was a Baptist minister. He pastored Holly Creek Baptist Church from 1888-1898. Sometime in the latter part of the 1880's they moved to Gilmer County. Julius rode a horse across the mountain from Gilmer County to Holly Creek once a month for services. He would fill his pockets with apples and give them to the children at church.

Henry and Elizabeth are buried at Pleasant Hill Cemetery in Ellijay.

Julius and Ann, as they were called, had ten children. Some of the children's names were Joseph, Jasper, Hester, Theodore, and Clinganin. Some of the children married and stayed in Murray County.

Julius and Ann, along with son Vollie, also a Baptist minister, moved to Sand Mountain, Ala., in the 1920's.

### John Timothy Crenshaw "Cren" Disheroon

John Timothy Crenshaw "Cren" Disheroon was born in Murray (later Whitfield) County, Ga., 22 July 1844. His father Irvin was born 1808 in North Carolina, the son of Isaac, born 1778 in Delaware, and wife Jane, born in 1785 in North Carolina. Isaac's father was Waitman Disheroon, who owned land in Rutherford County, N.C., about 1790. In 1810 the family lived in Franklin County, Ga., and in Habersham from 1820 to 1837. There, on 28 May 1835, Irvin married Frances Jarrard, born 1814 in South Carolina, daughter of David and Mary Roe Jarrard. In Lumpkin County, Irvin and Isaac drew land in the Georgia Gold Lottery. They became residents of Murray County, where Irvin operated a tannery in 1845.

Children of Irvin and Frances Disheroon, all born in Georgia, were: Gabriel I. b. 1836, m. 1st Mary Jane Wright, 2nd Amanda Ann Farris; Serrepta J. b. 1837, m. Charles E. Sneed; David Jarrard b. 1839, m. 1st Liza Melinda Wright, 2nd Minerva Gentle Wright; Nancy Caroline b. 1843, m. 1st Thomas F. Smith, 2nd James S. Tate; Cren Disheroon b. 1844, m. Cornelia R. Sitz; Elizabeth Ann Frances b. 1845, m. William J. Sitz; James Everett b. 1850, m. 1st Elizabeth Thompson, 2nd Sarah Knight; and Theodore S. b. 1852, m. Philadelphia Ellen-der Lowe.

A relative, Elizabeth Disheroon, lived in Walker County in 1850. Her children were: William, Waitman, Seaborn, Sarah, Manda, Andrew Jackson, and Martha J. They later lived in Arkansas.

Irvin's family moved to Chattooga County, then came to Jackson County, Ala. In Nov. 1860, the families moved to Grundy County, Tenn. During the
