Will of James Eagan

In the Name of God Amen the 30th day of October in the year of our Lord 1737, I James Eagan of Cape Fear in Bladen Precinct Being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God therefor calling unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my last will and testament: That is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and for my body I recommend it to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give, devise and bequeath of the same in the following manner and form:

In witness whereof I do order that in the first place all my debts and funeral charge be payed and satisfied.

Item: I likewise constitute, make and ordain my well beloved friend William Cary my only and sole Executor of this my last will and testament to receive all my lands and all other

He the said Cary when payed all debts is to return the rest of any there is unto my dearly beloved wife and daughter. I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other former testaments, Wills, legacies and Executors by me in any ways before this time made, willed and bequeathed, Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

Will of Catherine Edwards

In ye Name of God Amen this Twenty Second Day of May in ye year of our Lord 1755 I Catherine Edwards of Bladen County in North Carolina being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind & memory Thanks be given to Almighty God & Calling unto mind ye mortality of my body & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my last Will & Testament that is to say principally & first of all I give and recommend my soul into ye hands of God that gave it & for my body I recommend it to ye Earth to be decently buried in a Christian like & decent manner at ye discretion of my Executors nothing doubting but at ye General Resurrection I shall receive ye same again by ye mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give, devise & bequeath of ye same in ye following manner & form:

In witness I give & bequeath unto my dearly Beloved Son Robert Edwards ye plantation I formerly lived on containing one hundred & fifty acres of land with ye appurtenances thereto pertaining and all my stock of Cattle to be equally divided between Stephen Hollingsworth, Valentine Hollingsworth, Robert Edwards, my beloved Sons and all my debts at Cape Fear I leave unto my son Robert Edwards and all my stock of Horse & Mares I give unto my grandsons John Hollingsworth, Samuel Hollingsworth & Isaac Hollingsworth to be divided among them at ye discretion of their father and all my pewter knives & forks with other my household goods to be equally divided between Valentine Hollingsworth & Robert Edwards excepting two iron pots to Robert and all my weaving apparel to Ann Sutton, my daughter one gold ring, one English Half Crown and some other small pieces in a purse I leave to my son Robert. And what Cattle I have here to be equally divided among my daughter Ann's Sons and what money I have due from Valentine Hollingsworth which is one Guinea one Pisto and Twenty six Shillings Cut I will be equally divide between Ann Sutton & Robert Edwards my bed & furniture at Cape fear I leave to Robert Edwards my bed Clothes Lire to Ann Sutton and I do hereby make & Ordain Robert Edwards & Valentine Hollingsworth my Executors of this my last will & Testament allowing this only to be my last Will & Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the day & year above written.
