

6th I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Monroe one Bed and Clothes if she should get married and at the death of my wife a negro girl Violet or "Tilly" should have any increase. But in case they will not increase Mary shall have one half of the boy Bill or the work of the girl in money.

7th I give and bequeath at the death of my wife unto my son John Monroe one half of a hundred acre tract of land it being the piece of land it being the piece upon which I live

8th I give and bequeath in like manner to my son James Monroe the other half of the same tract

9th I give and bequeath at the death of my wife unto my son Archibald Monroe one hundred acres of land that is the piece below the Long Branch joining William Willis' land and one half of Bill.

10th The balance of my negroes, with their increase and the residue of my property, I leave for my wife to dispose among my sons, as she may deem proper.

11th If my wife should die before my son Arch^d Monroe arrives at the age of twenty one years I wish him to be educated out of my estate exclusive of the one hundred acres of land and one half of Bill.

12th If either of my daughters or sons after getting her or his part of my estate, should see evident lawful issue then her or his part shall be equally divided among the remaining heirs.

I nominate constitute and appoint my son John Monroe, Sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament revoking all former Will or Wills by me made at any time.

It is my wish that my daughter Flora have and enjoy all my real and personal estate of every description what so ever during her life and what may remain of my estate after my death it is my wish and desire that it be equally divided between my daughter Catherine McNeill Crague Taylor, of Taylorsville, NC

I also nominate and appoint my son Augustus and John J. McWilliam Executors to this my last Will and Testament.

1st Item As to what worldly estate it hath pleased god to bless me with in this world I give devise and bequeath in the following manner and form namely.

2^d Item First of all I give unto my half Brother John Cain Ten Shillings Sterling to him and his heirs forever.

3^d Item I give unto my half Brother James Cain the sum of Ten Shillings Sterling to him and his heirs forever.

4th Item I give and bequeath unto my nephew Joseph Cain the son of Samuel Cain the sum of Ten Shillings Sterling

5th Item I give and bequeath unto George Willis son of Robeson County the sum of Ten Shillings Sterling to him and his heirs forever.

6th Item I give and bequeath unto Ann Roberson the wife of Jonathan Roberson and daughter of Samuel and Susan Ann Cain one hundred

and fifty acres of land where I now live and two hundred acres joining the upper side and forming the lower side of Thomas Davis' lands during her Natural life at her death the land is to descend to her son Samuel Roberson with all orchards and houses thereon.

I give unto the said Ann Roberson two clocks now in the house and one Desk. tea equipage and the tools in the house and parlor bed and furniture

I give unto the said Ann Roberson two negro mules and her Chick Peas.

At the death of the said Ann Roberson I desire that the furniture and negroes with their increase may be divided among her children equally.

7th Item I give and bequeath unto Mary Stedman of Fayetteville N.C. one parlor bed and furniture and furniture,

8th Item I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth Beck wife of Benjamin Beck one parlor bed and furniture
