Will of Samuel Carver

In The Name of God Amen, The Twenty Third Day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty eight, I Samuel Carver of Bladen County in the Province of North Carolina being sick and weak in Body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God therefore, Calling to mind the mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye. Do make and ordain this my last will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it, and as touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give and dispose the same in the following manner and form. Imprimis it is my Will and I do order that in the first place all my just debts and Funeral Charges be paid and satisfied. Item I leave unto my Beloved wife Arcadia whom I constitute appoint and ordain only & sole Executrix to this my last will and Testament to and for her use during the time of her natural life The Plantation wherupon I now live and all the appurtenances thereunto belonging or appertaining which plantation contains one hundred and fifty acres of Land beginning at Samuel Pikes Carver then running parallel with the upper line, so far back as to make the Complement and after her death I bequeath the said plantation & premises to my Beloved Son Samuel Carver & his heirs and assigns forever. Also I give to my said Beloved wife one bed & furniture with my Riding Horse and her side saddle, and also a Tea Chest & six Silver Tea spoons, to dispose of as she thinks proper.

Item My will is that my Second Daughters Sarah and Mary Carver have the Cattle which they now claim as their own, and each of them a mare, and to my said daughter Sarah one Black Horse called Sutton; and to my said daughter Mary one Bay Horse named Spring.

Item I give and bequeath unto my Beloved son James Carver my lott or parcel of land lying in Wilmington near the dwelling house of Joseph Malls as will appear by a deed from Alexander Edwards to my Brother James Carver deceased to him his heirs & assigns for ever.

Item I give and bequeath unto my Beloved Brother William Maudsley one tract of land containing one Hundred acre Lying on the East side of the White Marsh near the Causeway to him his heirs and assigns forever for which he shall pay what quit rents that shall be due for the same at the time of his getting possession thereof.

Item: My will is that my Executrix shall sell all the remainder of my Lands and Mills as soon as opportunity presents or at least within one year after my death out of which my just debts shall be paid and the overplus & remainder if any there be shall be divided together with all the rest of my world goods and Chattles, equally between my said Beloved wife Arcadia and my aforesaid four Children and my will is that my Daughters Sarah and Mary Carver shall have their part in one year after my decease and that my sons Samuel and James Carver shall have their part as soon as they shall arrive to the age of Eighteen years.

Will of John Green

In the name of God Amen this twenty eight day of April Anno Dom 1749 I John Green being sick in body but of good and perfect memory thanks be to God and Calling to remembrance the uncertain Estate of this transitory life and that all flesh must yield when it shall please God to Call, do make and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to my son James Green one negroe named Daniel ~~Item~~: I give and bequeath unto my son James one hundred and fifty acres of land lying between John Elin and James Nitchel ~~Item~~: I give and bequeath unto my son Robert Green three hundred acres of land. ~~Item~~: I give and bequeath all my stock of Cattle and Horses and mares, sheep and five negros and the plantation whereon I live to be equally divided among my wife and six Children with all my household Furniture to be equally divided amongst them. ~~Item~~: I give and bequeath unto my eldest son John Green one shilling sterling money of Great Britain. ~~Item~~: I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Sarah one shilling sterling money of Great Britain and I hereby appoint my loving friends James Grange and James Kerr and my beloved wife full and sole Executors of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking, Disannulling and making void all former Wills and Bequests by me made and declaring this only to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal.
