 & form hereafter mentioned. Item. In the first place I bequeath my soul
 to God that gave it, and my body to be decently buried at the discre-
 -tion of my beloved wife & other Executors hereafter to be named.
Item I do will & bequeath unto my beloved wife Hanny Parks
 a negro woman named Suskey with her child that is not born
 & said woman increases, a horse called Bowling saddle and
Brindle her cows, two young cattle, a feather bed & furniture
Item unto my beloved daughter Polly I bequeath a negro
 to which called Dot, a feather bed & furniture; Item I bequeath a
 child of which my wife is now pregnant, I bequeath a negro
 boy called Hampton, also a feather bed & furniture; Item I
 bequeath unto all other property of mine such as Wares
Carriage & Huge, Household furniture, farming tools, to be sold at
 vendue & the proceeds of said sale with the interest until my
 children become of age to ^{the} chosen guardians to be equally divided
 between my wife & children above mentioned.
Item I do will & bequeath unto my mother Polly Bennett for this
 year only, as much corn & provisions as will support her & her
 stock, also one pair of cotton of common weight two plows &
 iron things as can be had. Item I bequeath unto my wife Rebecca
Miller a set of Waller's tools — And I here by constitute
 I appoint my friend James Parks Junr & my wife Hanny Parks
 the Executors of this my last will & testament. In witness
 hereof I do set my hand & seal this 9th day of July 1809 —
 signed sealed & acknowledged in presence of
Lydia Robinson & John Parks
