I nominate and appoint my nephew O. C. Cusick and Joe H. Gamble my executors and excuse them from giving bond.

FEBRUARY TERM 1918

IN RE J. N. MONDAY

I, James N. Monday, being advanced in years, but of sound mind and disposing memory, realizing that the length of life is uncertain while death is sure, do make, ordain and publish this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all wills by me at any time heretofore made.
