The last will & testament of Thomas Brown

I Thomas Brown of the County of Sullivan and State of New
 York hereby make publish & declare this as my last will
 and testament, revoking & making void all wills of every de-
 scription by me at any time heretofore made.

And first after the payment of costs of binding up my estate & funeral
 expenses attending the burial of my deceased, I will and be-
 queath all my personal property of every description to my
 son George Brown and my daughter Sarah Brown as follows:
 To my daughter Sarah Five (2) Cows all the household and
 kitchen furniture ^{of every description} also one safe and bureau now at John Smith's
 at Union.

To my son George I will & bequeath the remainder of my per-
 sonal property of every kind, including notes and accounts, togeth-
 er with accounts that may be due for services of my Station
 "Young Soldier" also all my farming utensils, including my
 Churn, Windmill &c.

I also will & bequeath to my son George my Station "Young
 Soldier" & all other stock & personal property not heretofore
 mentioned or disposed of.

Secondly I will & bequeath my plantation being the same as
 which I live to my son George Brown & daughter Sarah Brown
 to be equally divided between them upon the condition
 that they pay to my other three daughters viz Mary Ann
 Wheelock, Elizabeth Wheelock and Elizabeth Shipley the sum
 of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each to be paid within two
 years from the date of my decease.

The said estate not said land above bequeathed to my
 son George to be his during his life time and at his de-
 cease to descend to his legal heirs.

And the said estate bequeathed to my daughter Sarah Brown
 in said land I direct at her death to descend to her heirs
 & if she die without issue to be equally divided between
 my said three daughters Mary Ann Wheelock, Elizabeth
 Wheelock & Elizabeth Shipley exclusive of the disposition
 of said property by their husbands.

I hereby nominate my son George Brown as Executor of

this my last will and testament

Whereas I Thomas Brown of the County of Sullivan and State of New
 York in will have made my last will and testament in
 writing bearing date of May, the 1st 1872 in by which I have given
 and bequeathed to my daughter Sarah Brown two half of real
 estate I therefore change that part of the will and give the
 whole real estate to my son George Brown by his paying to
 Sarah Brown yearly, viz twenty dollars and fifteen bushels of
 wheat getting fire wood and grilling for her the said Sarah
 Brown to have the house and garden during her single
 life time when I am dead, I further change the conditions
 of payments to my three daughters Mary Ann Wheelock and
 Elizabeth Wheelock and Elizabeth Shipley that the said George
 Brown pay each of them two Hundred Dollars apiece at the
 expiration of five years from my decease, I have said
 will and bequeathed to my daughter Sarah in above will
 shall stand as to be further payments to her.

I also continue my son George Brown Executor to this my
 last will given under my hand and seal this the 26th day
 of March 1880
