In the name of God amen
 I Daniel O. King of Sullivan County Tenn. being of
 sound mind and memory do hereby make and declare
 this to be my last will and testament hereby making
 and making void all other wills by me at any time
 made. Having heretofore given and conveyed to my three
 daughters, Eliza Byers, Sally C. Latham and Caroline E.
 Painter all my landed estate (about 20000 worth to
 each) and having retained a support for myself and
 my wife during our natural lives in the land,
 bequeathed to Caroline E. Painter and having since that time
 given to Sally C. Latham one hundred and fifty
 dollars in cash, and to Caroline E. Painter one hundred
 and fifty dollars in cash and to D. C. Byers the only
 son of my deceased daughter Olivia Byers two hundred
 dollars it remains for me to dispose of the balance
 of my personal estate. And first to my beloved
 wife Marrianna (with whom I have lived happily
 for over fifty two years) I give and bequeath all my
 beds and five hundred dollars in cash to be hers
 absolutely. To each of my grandsons according my
 name, viz. D. C. Byers D. C. Latham and D. C. Painter
 I give and bequeath one hundred dollars.
 To each of my other grandchildren viz. Marrianna V.
 Latham, Betty Latham, Olivia F. Latham Charles W.
 Latham Robert H. Latham and Philip Painter I give
 and bequeath fifty dollars and to Philip Painter
 in addition I give and bequeath my bay mare
 or any horse I may have at the time of my decease.
 To my daughter Caroline E. Painter I give and bequeath
 my Mahogany side board and book case in the big
 room. To my grandson Jas. C. Latham I have already
 given more than fifty dollars to assist him in
 getting his education. And lastly to my
 daughters Sally C. Latham and Caroline E. Painter
 I give and bequeath all the remainder of my
 personal property and money to be equally

divided between them. In conclusion I appoint my Son-in-law Jonathan T. Painter, the executor of this my last will and testament, without requiring him to give bond or security.

A Codicil to the above Will.

Whereas since writing the above Will, my dear and beloved wife Mariaanna has departed this life and whereas I have advanced to my Grandson David O. Sathum the one hundred dollars devised to him, this will is null and void, so far as they are concerned, and in consideration of a request to that effect from my deceased wife I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Mariaanna V. Sathum one hundred dollars, instead of the fifty dollars mentioned heretofore. And lastly I repeat that to my surviving daughters Sally C. Sathum and Caroline C. Painter all my personal property & money not otherwise disposed of, I give to be equally divided between them. Seventhly I further give and bequeath to my son Levi Samuel Blakely one bed, that is one straw tick, one sheet and one feather tick and feathers and one calico quilt & also one trunk.

Eighthly I further give and bequeath to my son Henry Blakely all of my farming tools & gearings.

Ninthly I further give and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca Jane who married Taylor one dollar.

Tenthly I further give and bequeath to my son Taylor Blakely one dollar.

Eleventhly I direct that my Store be sold to pay my funeral expenses and debts.

Twelfthly And I direct that the remaining property be sold to pay my debts; and if there is any money left from the sale of said property after paying my debts I direct that it be given to my son Doctor Blakely.

Thirteenthly I give and bequeath to my son William Blakely one Book the title of which is "Moody Sermons".

Fourteenthly I give and bequeath to my son Doctor Blakely one dollar.
