

Last Will & Testament
James H. Miller died Testated April Term 1901

I James H. Miller, do make and publish this as my last will and Testament, hereby revoking and making void all others by me at any time made. First I direct that my funeral expences and all my debts be paid as soon after my death as possible, out of any moneys that I may die possessed of, or may first come into the hands of my executor. Secondly I will that all the personal property that I may die possessed of be sold at public sale, on six & twelve months with interest from date, all sums under five dollars to be paid for, cash in hand, the proceeds of which together with what money & notes that I have on hands at my death go into the hands of my executor as soon as possible for the benefit of my children - to be paid out as follows, Robert H. Miller, Charles David Miller and Edith E. Miller, one third each as they come of age, also the interest up to the time of said payment. I also will that my two youngest children, namely, Charles David and Edith E. Miller, be placed in the hands and care of Mrs. Belle Kyle as guardian, to do for and care for the best that she can - either to keep them or provide good homes for them as she thinks best, until they are of age - Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint Samuel J. Kyle my Executor. In witness whereof I do to this my will, set my hand this the 20 day of March 1901.
