In the name of God Amen.

I Henry Storing of Washington County being now
State of Maryland being of sound and perfect mind and memory, Being
in God, do this tenth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred and one, make and publish this my last will and Testament
in the manner following, that is to say, first I give and bequeath unto my beloved
wife Mary Ann Storing all the property of property during her widowhood and of
the land to be held, the widow shall have the benefit during her life and at her
death to avoid doubts to my heirs and of my Heirs James Barney perform
his contract. When he the said Barney comes of age concerning the parcel of
land which the Testator and P. Barney has contributed for then my Executors
shall pay P. Barney. am still am selling by the name of Silver. am one for
them am sold that is now for sale. am now and going am set of place. am
am and if P. Barney will not fulfill his contract, then the P. Barney to continue
as they are. Secondly, I give and bequeath unto my son David and Isaac Storing
the above mentioned land to be divided equally between them and they are to have
an share of any other property, if the land is obtained and if not an equal share
with the rest of my heirs. Thirdly, my dear daughter Henry, Polly and Peggy
Barney and Nancy, William, Henry, Thomas, John & Henry Storing shall
have and share equal of the movable property any of the above named heirs
that is disordered. to their Mother Margaret Storing my wife and do not
contain to live with her until they are married, if the P. Margaret Storing shall
live beyond my widow, and for their disordered, they or any of them shall
be cut out of their share by getting one dollar and fifty cents. Unto my wife Margaret
I give and bequeath her saddle and her and furniture and to do with them as
she pleases. And I hereby make and declare my beloved wife Margaret
Storing and my worthy friend William Ward, Executors of this my last
will and Testament. In Witness Whereof I the P. Henry Storing, have to this
my last will and Testament, set my hand and seal the day and year
above written.

Frederick Sanders Will

To all whom it may concern

I Frederick Sanders of Washington County in the State of Maryland being now
being of sound and disposing mind and memory, having in mind the uncertainty of this life do make & publish
this my last will and Testament in manner & form following, first I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife
Margaret the use of the plantation I now live on for her support if she shall choose to stay on it until my son
Frederick shall come to the age of twenty one years and in that case that is when my said son shall come to be of age, my
said wife and said son to have the said plantation between them and my said wife shall live on it and shall
choose to live on it but on my said wife choosing not to live on it or in case of her death then in either case my son
shall have the whole of the land. Thirdly I give and bequeath unto my said wife all my household furniture
to be hers and one half of the horse team and one half of the cow team and the other half of the sheep and half the hogs the
cows and three calves to go to gether the cows I bequeath together the several eggs of the hogs to be divided as many
as may be my said wife to have the cows of the horse team the cows & three calves the cows & three lambs &
in the separate eggs of the hogs to be hers for ever - fourthly I give & bequeath to my said son my
single gun & the other half of all my stock and all my wearing apparel - fifthly my will & desire
is that what doctors charge that may be on hand at the time of my death may be paid for what they
may judge for to discharge the expenses of the execution of this my last will & Testament out of the balance
of the said estate to be given to them to discharge the above expenses the son - sixthly to my said wife
wholly and entirely I do bequeath & appoint my beloved friend Jacob Simmons of Washington
County in the State of Virginia to be executor of this my last will and Testament -
and writing whereof I the said Frederick Sanders do hereby ratify this my last will & Testament
making & declaring all other will or wills heretofore by me made this last day of June
above named and acknowledge in the
presence of

to be true to the above last will and Testament. And when as nothing in the above
will is said about my farming tools my wife and desire is that they stay on the
plantation for the use thereof for my said wife and said son as a home until
they choose to be considered as an article in my said will and that nothing of my property be
excepted the drugs until after the decision that may be made between my said wife &
said son
