I Adam Wallenberg do of the County of Washington
and State of Tennessee being of advanced age, possessing a sound mind, calling to mind
my Morbidity, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament, wishing all
former Wills and Testaments as follows to be void and that my worldly property
after defraying the expenses of a decent and Christian funeral of my body
and payment of all my just debts be distributed as follows. In witness whereof
I my dearly beloved wife Elizabeth Wallenberg all my household and kitchen
furniture, Bed and furniture to be for her use and all my farming utensils, until my
youngest child comes of age. It is my will to have all my stock of horses, cows,
hogs and sheep and all other perishable property for the use of my wife to
remain the family until the youngest child comes of age and as my children
come to age. Each one of them hereafter mentioned shall have a horse worth
between fifty and sixty dollars and a common saddle and bridle as soon as
my son can have horses saddled and bridled. With the amount above mentioned
said William Wallenberg, Adam Wallenberg's Son, John Wallenberg and Peter Wallenberg
do it is my wish those three mentioned shall have a horse saddle and bridle at the
same prices as the sons say. Solomon, Michael, Frederick, George, Samuel Wallen-
bergs do as it is my wish that my daughter Elizabeth Wallenberg and Sally Wallen-
berg as they arrive at the age of eighteen years to have each of them a saddle worth
twenty dollars and each of them two cows and each of them fifty dollars and
money otherwise and each a bed and furniture and a sewing table. And it is my
will that my son Solomon Wallenberg on the account of being infirm, to
have one thousand dollars out of the first money that is collected to be
applied for his education and this is to be entered from an equal hand with
the rest of the Legates and it is my wish that four boys, to wit, Michael, Frederick,
George & Samuel, Wallenberg, be sent to school to learn to read and understand
the Rule of Three and it is my wish that my two Daughters Elizabeth & Sarah
be sent to school to learn to read and write and for the above mentioned four
boys and two girls for their education to be paid out of my estate. And if my
wife Elizabeth should depart this life before my youngest child comes of age
all my property both Real and Personal shall be sold at public sale and as
my son Peter Wallenberg learns the Blacksmith trade, there is to be and
thousand dollars deducted out of his share of his legacy and if my wife
should live until my youngest child comes to be of age, she shall have my
cotton cupboard and furniture, Clock, seven, one Barrow, two milk Cows, one mare
and saddle and bridle, one Bed and furniture, one egg, one butter and as much household
and kitchen furniture as may be necessary to keep my house and then the same shall be
divided among the Legates. All the money that I own from the plantation
that I own in Tennessee and what is not due as soon as can be collected and the debts
owed, the balance to be divided among the Legates, those of age to have their part then
and those not of age, the money to be put to interest until they arrive at age. All other notes,

 this twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & thirty
 five made & publish this my last will & testament in manner following. I do hereby
 First I give and bequeath unto my wife Sarah Bayles one half of the land on which
 I now reside containing about two hundred & twenty five (more or less) so contained
 the mansion house & barn I also give her the black woman Mary or Jane & her two
 children Edmond & Thomas and also one half the child of the woman being known by
 the name of Abraham and one horse or mare or two of them of the brand of dark or
 the may charr. Out of my stock of hogs after my decease also two large white
 sows and one yearling calf all of her choosing also six sheep & eight hogs including a
 birding four twelve year if I should have that number being also two birds of feather
 and duck clothing as the may request therewith also my clothing the book belonging
 and such books as the may wish also my cupboard and such cupboard as may be
 as the may choose also one large pot & smaller one one large oven & a smaller one
 and a sheet as shown. The above named land and property to remain at the will
 or making of my said wife the land as hereafter created and the other property in
 common with my other movable estate my heirs to have and hold of me or her heirs
 after my death subject to the same rules as the rest of her property and a deficiency of goods
 then she can raise. Secondly I give & bequeath unto my son William Bayles my
 clothing and playing instrument. Thirdly I give & bequeath unto my son David Bayles
 one half of the land on which I now reside and one hundred and twenty five (more or less)

the children of my daughter Polly Brown one hundred & fifty acres of land (more or less)
 whereon Samuel Brown and John Noble now live which has been divided between said Brown and
 Noble by William Bayles and a deed is to be made by my executor agreeable to said deed when the
 her form the conditions here set out. That is to say Samuel Brown is to pay his brother Augustus
 and Anderson Brown ninety four dollars each and his sister Elizabeth Brown twenty four dollars
 and John Noble having paid his wife sister Polly Rice one hundred dollars and Matilda Hyatt
 eighty dollars and fifty cents & he is also to pay Hannah Brown eighty dollars & fifty cents
 and ninety four dollars to Matilda Brown and also pay two notes in my hands amounting
 to about sixty dollars each in the payments to Polly Brown's children each are to get a sweet
 horse and the value of any in other good tools he is also to pay Nathan Brown ninety four
 dollars as above. Fourthly I give & bequeath ninety four dollars unto Polly Brown's son
 Isaac Brown in the manner following (that is) by the sale of a part of land that I purchased of John
 G. Goodrich is which Charles Hay executed a deed to me. The sale to take place when Isaac is twenty
 one year of age and after paying said Isaac the money to be equally divided amongst also
 Polly Brown's children including Isaac and the executor to make a deed.
 Fifthly I give & bequeath to my son John Bayles the black mule John Noble Brown now
 being sixty dollars more or less. Sixthly I give & bequeath to my daughter Hannah
 Hope the land lying south & east of the following lines. That is Beginning at two black oak
 trees north of John Samons corner thence running south thirty six half acres with one house
 and eight poles more or less to a stone post Oak & White Oak then north eighty six feet
 eight poles to a stone in Samons line then a three hundred acre grant of mine then east
 fifty poles to a stone then a corner of mine to be south sixty six feet fifty six poles more
 or less so as to strike two black oaks a corner of mine and David Samons. Labeled to be
 two hundred acres more or less but of which is excepted one and a fourth acre more or
 less for the widow house and burying ground. The above land to remain in the
 name of said Hannah during her natural life then my wife is that it should
 be her children. Eighthly I give & bequeath unto my son Samuel Bayles
 one half of the money I have to Robert Hargis Judgment. Ninthly I give
 and bequeath unto my son Nathan Bayles the youngest note I hold on John Noble
 of sixty dollars more or less. Tenthly I give & bequeath to my daughter Rebecca
 during her natural lifetime so much of my land as or more the tract of land called the
 Woods tract as is south & east of the following lines. Beginning on a State in Pine
 Edwards line then north twenty five feet one hundred & twenty eight poles and then
 line said course twenty six poles further to a State. Then south to State line at her
 death to divide to her heirs if she has any of note to be sold and the money divided
 amongst all my children & Polly Brown's children to be considered as one child or her
 share. Eleventhly I give & bequeath unto my daughter Matilda Hays and
 Hannah Hope children all my land at one time the old mill above Henry Wells
 and when John Hampton now lives above Pine White land. Twelfthly I give &
 bequeath unto my son Augustus Bayles one half of the land called the home place
 this natural lifetime. Thirteenthly my wife is that after the death of my
 the land left her to be sold and the money divided amongst all my children & the
