Peasants, my Gun two matts two Baskets two
yards of Virginia Linning also my Chest and all that
is in it twelve Shillings in Edmund Montaloms
+ hands that he owes me also one hundred & twenty
pounds of Tobacco in Samuel Hittiman and hand
that he owes me my horse I desire may be sold
and turned into Cash for the good of the said
all these things I desire to be equally divided among
all the aforesaid Children to them and their heirs
for ever

 Robert Smith now lives with all appurtenances
 him the said Sterlin Newlon and his heirs for
 ever and if the said Sterlin die without heirs then
 it shall goe to my Brother Johnathan Newlon
 and his heirs, and for default of his heirs to
 my Sister Sarah and her heirs lawfully
 begotten of her body

Item I give to my brother Johnathan Newlon my
 Riding horse saddle

Item I give my mare to my Brother Sterlin Newlon

Item I give to my Sister Sarah Newlon one Cow
 I give to Sarah

Item I give my Brother Johnathan one Steer

Lastly I do appoint my Loving Friend Robert
 Carter full and wholly my Executor of this my

 for divers good Causes and Considerations most
 moving, but especially for and in Consideration of
 and affection I bare to my well beloved Son William
 Darby, I have given, granted and confirmed, like as
 these presents I do give, grant, and confirm to my
 Son William Darby, the plantation he now liveth on
 containing fifty two Acres of Land to say his and
 his heirs for ever - So that neither I the said Daniel
 Darby, nor any Claiming from by or under me, shall
 at any time or times hereafter, after, Challenge
 Revert or demand any Right, Title or Estate to the
 aforesaid Land In Witness whereof I have hereunto
 set my hand and Seal the 12th day of September
 Anno Dom 1696.
