Cornall being sick and weak in body but of sound and
perfect memory Thanks be given to the Almighty God for
some, and knowing the uncertainty of this Life on Earth
and being desirous to settle things in order do make this
my last will and Testament in manner and form as followeth
That is to say first I principally I commend my Soul to the Almighty
God my Creator assured by believing that I shall receive
full pardon and free Remission of all my Sinnes & be saved
by the precious death & merits of my Redeemed Saviour and
Redeemer Christ Jesus and my body to the death from
whence it was taken to be buried in such decent manner as
my Executors hereafter mentioned shall think fitt as touching
such worldly Estate as the Lord in mercy hath lent me my
will & bequeathing it to my said Executors & bequeathing
hereafter by this my will is expressed and first I do

revoked & annulled & make void all wills by me formerly
made & devised & appoint this my last will & testament to stand in
full force power & vertue

Item I give & bequeath unto my son Thomas Tinnall to his heirs for ever
one hundred & fifty acres of Land that is to say y^e South west
part of my decessed wifes son I now dwell that is to say to be
divided from the Swarth or run of water that is to say to be
swamp & run before my house into y^e Branch is to be to the
Division on his Grounds so far as to y^e South End of y^e Fitch
at the head of the Slath & from y^e place to run by a ditch line
so yt it shall equally divide my Land into two parts yet so yt the
nor any one of my children shall disturb or molest my loving
wife of all or any benefitts or priviledges in all yt I do possess
during her Life

Item I give & bequeath unto my son John Tinnall to his heirs
for ever one hundred & fifty acres of Land that is to say the
northern part of my decessed wifes son I now dwell that is to say
aforesaided to y^e Line y^e divides between me & James
with there mother till they attaine to the age of twenty one
years, but in case my wife shall marry that then at her day
of marriage they shall be both free to dispose of themselves
But if in case my two sons or either of them should die
without lawfull issue from there Mother lawfully begotten
that then my Land shall be given as followeth that is to say
that part I now live on formerly given to my son Thomas
Tinnall & to her lawfull issue & bequeath unto my daughter Anne
part formerly given to my son John for ever and the other
I shall my decessed daughter Margaret like & her lawfull
issue shall enjoy the same for ever and in case my wife
should marry that then my son Thomas Tinnall shall
have free & full possession of one half of my Sweetmeats
house and Orchard & Edward mill without any other
consideracon and I do enjoyn my son Thomas Tinnall
to keep the Orchard & Edward mill & to keep y^e order &
plant for & sufficiently fenced & walled & also to
keep y^e sufficient distance upon y^e part of Land

appoynted & divided with them

minority & my desire is that 20 acres of Marsh be bought

This Indenture made y^e Seaventhenth day of September
in the yeaere of our Lord God one thousand six hundred
ninety and fiftie Between Samson Olcott of Somers
County in the Province of Maryland eldest son of Samuel
and Samuel Hittiman of Accomack County in the
Virginia of the other part Witnesseth That the said
Samson Olcott for and in consideration of nine thousand
pounds of good Tobacco and cash paid by receipt whereof
I doo hereby acknowledge and of every part and parcel
thereof doo for ever acquit exonerate and discharge the
said Samuel Hittiman his heirs Executors and admors
Inshewed confirmed and Delivered Alsd as by these Writings
I doo give Grantation Bargaine sell assigne confirm and Deliver unto the said Samuel Hittiman his
heirs Executors admin and assigns for ever foure hundred
acres of Land Situate Lying and being in the County of
Accomack in Virga afore the which said foure hundred
acres of Land is partly of a Divident of six hundred acres
purchased by me the said Samuel Olcott of George
Layfield Esq^r Elizabeth his wife's Executors of the will
of her husband deceased as by their Conveyance bearing date y^e
15th day of November 1692 and now upon Record in the
County of Accomack may apppeare two hundred
acres over and besides the said six hundred acres of land
the said Samuel Olcott by these presents aliened to y^e said
Hittiman was by me conveyed to y^e said Samuel Hittiman
as by my Deed of Sale bearing date y^e first day of August
1688 & acknowledged upon Record in y^e County of
Worcester the said six hundred acres of land may also
apppeare the said six hundred acres of Land bounding
Woodward partly on y^e marked trees of Mr Pitts his land
and partly on Adams Branch and from the Branch
first called by north a quarter of a point North by East
three hundred poles Then South by East half a point
of a point South by East three hundred and forty poles to y^e corner
of James Taylor's land thence West by line degree north
one hundred poles and two poles to y^e next marked tree
