rington of the County of Accomack being Very Sick & Weak of Body but
of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God. Therefore Calling un-
mind the mortality of my Body & knowing that is appointed for all men
once to dye do make and ordain this my Last will and Testament that is to
say principally and first of all. I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God and
my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in Christian buriall but the discre-
tion of my Executors nothing Doubting but at the Generall resurrection I shall
reave the same by the mighty power of God. And as touching such Worldly Estate wherewith
it hath pleased God to bless me in this Life. I give demise and Dispose of the same in the
following manner and form. I give and bequeath to my son. Son Stephen Wor-
rington and John Worrington the Plantation where my father Stephen Worrington lived con-
sisting by Estimation two hundred acres of Land lying and being at the head of a narrow
Creek between the land of Robert Norton and David West. I now live on that. I thought of
Charles Leatherbury to them and their heirs forever to be equally divided in quantity but my
son John Worrington to have that part where he now lives on them. I give and bequeath unto
my son Jonathan Worrington the Plantation where I now live on that. I thought of Charles
Leatherbury by Estimation one hundred acres of land to him. I have now of-
ficially begotten of his body and in case of want of such heirs to my son James Worrington. I
have heirs forever. I give and bequeath unto my son Stephen Worrington my young wife
and Seal after my wife widowhood. I give and bequeath unto my son John Worrington
my gown after my wife widowhood to be bequeathed. I give and bequeath unto my son the Wor-
rington. I give. I shall up & out in a house here but not to be paid during my wife widowhood
I give and bequeath unto my son Jonathan Worrington one Five year old kiff or the
value of it to be paid after my wife widow be a year. I give and bequeath unto my
daughter Ann Worrington one bit and bit. I shall and the furniture that belongs to it and a look-
ing Glass and fifteen. I shall up & out in a house. Here the bed that is called her bed. I give
I give and bequeath unto my loving wife my large bible and her riding saddle &c. I give
unto her and her disposing. I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Sarah Worri-
on all my Estate both real and personal during her Widowhood freely and peaceably to be
Possess & my will is if any of my three sons Stephen. John. or Jonathan Worrington have
amind to. settle on any part not. Interrupting their mothers service or disturbing
of her of any of the improvements then my will is that they may have liberty to live there-
on my will is that all my personal Estate be equally divided between my three children
which I had by my Wife Sarah Worrington to say James Margrett. Packerll Sarah
William Benjamin and Jacob Worrington after my Wife decease or Widow hood.
I also appoint my beloved wife and my son Jonathan Worrington to be my Executors
of this my last will and testament and I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disan-
null all and every other former wills Legacies by me in any ways before this time
named willed and bequeathed Ratifying this and no other to be my Last will and

in Virginia being Sick & Weak of Body but of sound mind and understanding
knowing that all flesh must yield unto Death when it shall please the Almighty
God to call us do make this my last will & Testament as follows the first & principally
give my soul unto the Almighty God that gave it hoping through the merit and Sufferings
of my only Saviour Jesus Christ to have pardon of my sins and my body
to the earth to be decently Buried at the discretion of my loving wife hereinafter named
I will that all just Debts be paid. Now I give unto my loving wife Elizabeth
a bed and furniture as follows a table & chairs & a trundle bed belonging as it stands
in the parlor also a bed pan warming pan Iron Drying pan also her choice of
two fowls & Cakes at my Dwelling plantation her choice of my best gown Iron
Spill my Thackel a Spooning Wheel the freshen me with her choice of the best fowls
Chairs in the House a sea table her riding horse bridle saddle a Silver Dish
& Silver Spoon also a Negro Woman called Pollina to her and heirs for ever
Also I have sent for a piece of Damask by Mr. Brown of the Merchant for my
wife if it Returns I give it her a young horse called Cakes Coll & a Negro Girl called
Elizabeth for her Now I give unto my wife & her John Robins for Spindle and
Bensel my plow three & three in the Court plow & harrows for the plantation use & three
Servants. I give unto my said Wife half the powerledge & benefit of a parcel of Land
of land & marsh lying on my Dwelling plantation called the Little pasture also half my
Dwelling Plantation three casks & departments the rents belonging during
her natural life I give my said wife powerledge to pasture and keep eighteen head of
cattle also a Horse & mare in my great Neck during her natural life. Now I give unto
my Daughter Barbara a molata Boy called Charles a Slave unto her & her heirs law-
fully begotten on her body for ever also a Spooning Wheel that is called hers also a bed &
a Spots Rug & furniture thereunto belonging standing in the parlor Chamber & an Iron
Drying pan and a Dozen of new plates two new Dishes & two new Chansons & a dozen of
