in County of Accomack being sick and weak of Body but of sound  
Memory giving praise to Almighty God for the same be all after his Merit  
and blessing, bestowed on me & considering w<sup>th</sup> my self the uncertain-  
-ty of w<sup>ch</sup> any life I do therefore make & appoint this to be my last  
will & Testament Rescaking all other will, or wills, by me formerly  
made and first and principally I bequeath my soul to God the  
Great Creator hoping & stedfastly believing through the mercy & bounti-  
-fication of Jesus Christ, to receive a full & free pardon for all my sins  
and a place amongst the Elect in w<sup>ch</sup> I had my happiness, & for what w<sup>ch</sup>  
pleaseth the Lord in his Mercy hath bestowed on me I do order & bequeath  
in manner following

I give & bequeath to my son Scarborough Drummond two good Bedd & fur-  
-niture sett for them one to have Curtains & vallicians the other not of  
also give my son Scarborough twenty shillings, Item I give & bequeath  
to my son Richard Drummond my Plantation house live on Inland  
w<sup>ch</sup> I have bought of half moon Island w<sup>ch</sup> is all of w<sup>ch</sup> I have bought  
belonging to him & his heirs for ever I also give to my son Richard  
four Negroes (viz) Summers Dick Hagar & Hapney to him & his heirs for  
ever only the first Child that the Negro Hagar shall bring that  
shall live to w<sup>ch</sup> age of two years old I give & bequeath to my  
Grandson Richard Drummond to him & his heirs lawfully begotten  
of his body & my will is that if my Grandson should dye without  
such issue as afores<sup>d</sup> that then I give the Child to my son Richard  
& his heirs for ever, I also give to my son Richard my mill & all  
the appurtenances therunto belonging & Item I give & bequeath  
to my Granddaughter Elizabeth Drummond my Negro Girl named Hunter to  
her & her heirs lawfully begotten of her body, but in case my afores<sup>d</sup>  
Granddaughter should dye without such issue that then I give if  
a Girl to my Grandson Richard & his heirs lawfully begotten & in

the my grand son Richard should dye without issue I give & give a girl to my  
 Grand son Spencer & his heirs for ever I also give to my Granddaughter Elizabeth  
 smallest bed in of Hall Chamber & all the furniture thereunto belonging & a  
 half a dozen of new powder dishes & a dozen new powder plates & a dozen  
 of new pewter spoons & a pair of new Diapers bought of my son Richard  
 a piece of Chard Latine bought of Mr. William Wields & a piece of fine  
 bought of Mr. Anderson Dalrymple. -- Here I Give to my son Richard  
 five Negro's more named as followeth (viz) Lawrence, Robin, Bandy, Bep,  
 & Benn to him & his heirs forever unless the Child that my Negro Bep goes  
 w<sup>ch</sup> I give to my Grandson Spencer Drummond & his heirs lawfully begotten  
 of his body & they will is that my son Richard Drummond shall send my  
 son Scarborough such necessary as he shall think convenient for his  
 support & my will is also that if my son Scarborough should marry & have  
 lawfull issue that then my son Richard to pay a young Negro to  
 each of three of his first Children when they shall come to 7. Age of  
 two year or the 3. young Negro to be of the same Age or there abo-  
 = ut - Here I Give to my son Richard Drummond all my personal-  
 Estate he Leasing to his brother Scarborough such of the same as he  
 & my Brother will Drummond shall think necessary for him --  
 I do also constitute and appoint my Brother Will Drummond & my  
 son Richard Drummond to be my whole & sole Executors to see this  
 my will fully performed in all points according to the true Intent &  
 meaning thereof all which Doe Confirm with my hand & seal this  
 24 day of February Anno. do. 1720
