The condition of the above obligation is such that if the above bounden Henry Nicholson shall and truly perform the Office of Executor of Robert Vincent late of Alexandria County deceased according to law and shall in all respects discharge the duties of him required by law as Executor aforesaid without any injury or damage to any person interested in the faithful performance of said office then the above obligation to be void else to remain in full force and virtue in law.

May of the town of Alexandria my sole Executor, of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former Wills made by me. In the name of God Amen I William Cooper Merchant residing for some time past in the Town of Alexandria in the District of Columbia being perfectly sound in mind altho afflicted with a disorder doubtful issue do make and declare the following arrangement of my affairs in case an unfavorable issue to the disorder with which I am now afflicted.

In the first place it is my wish that all money of which I may now be possessed and also what may arise from the sale of my property in this country and the payment of debts due to me after the satisfying of all just claims against me be remitted with as much expedition as may be consistent with safety to Mr John Alpe of No 8 Fish Street Hill London And for the carrying into effect of this arrangement I appoint my friend Magnus Strubling Esqr Merchant and request him to attend to the same August 25<sup>th</sup> 1819

In presence of the following witnesses who having hear the above read to William Cooper after having heard it dictated to the writer by him did hear him in an audible voice declare his assent to the same he being incapable either of signing or making his mark in consequence of a paralytic affection of the hands. Let the subscribers do certify that he did dictate the articles of this said arrangement and did assent to the same when read to him In Testimony of which we have in his presence and in the presence of each other hereunto set our hands and affixed our seals this day and year before written.

Be it remembered that on this 30<sup>th</sup> day of August 1819 before me Alexandria Street Register of Wills for Alexandria County in the District of Columbia came Charles Chapin and Gustavus A Brown two of the subscribing witnesses
