firmly by these presents sealed with our seals and dated this seventh day of
October 1820.

The Condition of the above obligation is such that if the above
bounden Robert Brockett as guardian of William Lyle shall faithfully ac-
count with the Orphans Court of Alexandria County as directed by law for the
management of the property and estate of the orphan under his care, and shall
also deliver up the said property agreeably to the order of said Court or the direction
of law, and shall in all respects perform the duty of Guardian to the said William
Lyle according to law then the above obligation shall cease it shall otherwise
remain in full force and virtue in law.

management of the property and estate of the orphan under his care and shall also
deliver up the said property agreeably to the order of said Court or the directions of
law, and shall in all respects perform the duty of Guardian to the said orphan
according to law then the above obligation shall cease it shall otherwise
remain in full force and virtue in law.

I am now in a very low state of health at my grand fathers. should I never
be able to leave this house to dispose of my property as follows to wit

I give to Eliza McDonald Two hundred dollars, and my watch
To my Aunt Cleaver Wallace if I die here thirty dollars to be paid in cash

To my brother John Milligan to be expended in giving him an education
and preparing him for a trade or some profession five hundred dollars

To my Sister Sarah Milligan One hundred dollars To my Aunt Anne
Milligan of George Town I give as a small testimony of the high esteem in which
she holds her Fifty dollars To my Aunt Eva Wallace if I die here I give twenty
dollars I do hereby exonerate my father from a debt due me of Fifty seven
and $\frac{1}{2}$ dollars I give all my clothes to my Brother Robert My breast pin I give
to Stephen MacDonald. The remainder of my estate after paying all necessary funer-
al expenses &c I wish to be divided equally amongst my three sisters Hannah
Margaret and Cleaver, and my two brothers Joseph and Thomas, and to be expended
as far as possible in educating them

This paper I publish & declare as my last will
& testament and as executors thereof I do hereby appoint my Master Joseph
Milligan & Mr Alexander McDonald of the City of Washington.

I am at this moment through the mercy of a kind providence, blessed
with my perfect senses though reduced to so weak a state of body that I
expect to live but a very short time & have therefore been induced to write
this instrument which though informal & roughly done I wish us before declare
to be considered as my last will and testament Given under my hand &
seal in Perry County in the State of Pennsylvania the eleventh day of Nov-
ember in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty
quæst in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty
