Memorandum as my last will and Testament, after my funeral Expenses are paid and my just Debts discharged I will and Bequeath all my real and personal Estate whatever, and of whatever Description as well as all property, Debts, Dues and demands due me from the late concern of William Cary to my son Joseph Noble Cary, hoping that my Friend George Rural Black of Fairfax County will act as my Executor, allowing out of my Estate a gentle comfortable living for life to Mary Eliza Cary Mother of the above named Joseph Noble Cary, and the said Joseph N. Cary to be under the Direction and management of his Mother; At the same time I revoke all former Wills more especially one made in favor of Thomas Williams crossing him all I prefer, this was made I believe in 1785 or 1786, however I disavow any Will whatever to said Thomas Williams, as my request and intention is not to leave him or any person other relatives or any belonging to him one Shilling, but let his own guilty conscience be his Monitor, I sincerely request my Executors to be guarded against this Man as he will no doubt take all advantages of my Estate; this is a rough sketch but in case of sudden Death, being at this time in sound mind and Memory my desire is what is herein contained shall be considered my last will and Testament.
