is appointed for all men once to dye Do make and declare this my last
Will and Testament. That is to say first I recommend my Soul to God
who gave it. And my Body to the earth to be buried in a Christian like
and decent manner at the direction of my Executor and as touching such
worldly Estate as it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give devise
and bequeath of the same in the following manner and form. First I order
that all just debts and funeral charges be paid and satisfied. Secondly I give
and bequeath unto Sarah my beloved Wife the plantation known by an
Containing four hundred and eighty Acres during her life or Widowhood
and then to fall to my Son George. Thirdly I allow that my Son Thomas
have four hundred Acres joining Widens Harbors line and likewise
the Black Station and the brown Mead. Fourthly I allow that my Son
Henry have the other four hundred and eight Acres He and George
paying to my two Daughters Jean and Mary each of them their portion
when they have an occasion for it. Likewise I allow that my Wife get
Ten pounds of Pennsylvania money for Nursing and Schooling my Daughter
Mary. Fifthly I allow my Daughter Agnes Cleath to make her two
Hoodies and five shillings in money. Sixthly I Constitute my beloved
Wife Sarah to be my only and sole Executor of this my last Will and
Testament. And I do hereby utterly Disallow Revoke and Disannul all and
every other former Wills and Executors made by me in any way before
this time In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal
this twentieth seventh day of Dec^{em} 1742
