Item Just is my desire all my Just debts shall be paid.

I then I give unto my well beloved wife Betsy Campbell the plantation whereon I now live and all my Stocks of Horses Hogg. Sheep and hogg (except as to one two year old Heifer) to have and Enjoy the same during her life or Widowhood with all my household furniture Linnen and at her death or marriage the Whole of all the said Stocks Horses cattle Sheep hogg and Household furniture

to be sold and the money arising from the said Sale to be equally
 divided amongst ^{all} my Children. Except my Son John
 Item. I give to my Son John One Shilling Sterling.
 Item. I give to my well beloved Son Ambrose Campbell
 One hundred Acres of Land adjoining the Glebe being the
 same whereon ~~he~~ now lives to him and his heirs forever
 Item. I give to my beloved Son. Aaron Campbell One
 hundred Acres of Land Joining Ambrose Campbell's to him
 and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved Son. Sell Campbell One hundred
 Acres of Land being the same whereon I now live at the
 Decase or Marriage of my beloved Wife Chauncy Campbell
 to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my beloved Grandson Henry Cashwa
 One Two Years Old Heifer and Lastly do appoint
 as Executors to this my last Will and Testament.

(Reserving all others.) my well beloved Wife Chauncy
 Campbell Laurence Campbell & Aaron Campbell.

the 3 Executors took the Oath prescribed by Law and
with Joseph Cabell and James Higginbotham
then Secus acknowledged bond in the Penalty of
two hundred pounds with the conditions required
by Law.
