Will and Testament, hereby revoking all others by me
at any time made. I give devise and bequeath
to my dear children John J. Lloyd Junior and Rebecca
Lloyd and the survivor of them, and the heirs, executors
and administrators of such survivor, all my estate and
property of every kind and description, real personal and
mixed wherever the same may be, to be held by them
and such survivor of them, for the comfortable support
and maintenance of themselves and my other children,
and for the proper education of such children, that is
to say, for the comfortable support and maintenance
and proper education of said John J. Lloyd Junior,
Rebecca Lloyd, Nelly S. Lloyd, Eliza F. Lloyd and
Arthur S. Lloyd; and after the performance of said trusts
it is my will and I direct that all the residue and
remainder of my said estate and property, real personal
and mixed shall be equally divided between my said
children, and the survivors of them to have and to hold

to them and their respective heirs; the children or child of any
deceased child to take the portion, which such child would
have had if alive. I hereby constitute and appoint my said
children John J. Lloyd Junior and Rebecca Lloyd, the joint
and several executors of this my will, and I direct that neither
they, nor either of them shall be required to give security as such
executor or executors, nor shall it be necessary for them or either of
them to have any appraisal of my estate or property. Witness
