Wesley Carlton of the County of Alexandria State of Virginia
Lives and being of sound and disposing mind and memory do hereby
make and ordain this my last will and testament hereby re-
voking any and all wills by me at any time heretofore made.
First: I give, devise, and bequeath unto my friend George R.
Adams of Alexandria County Virginia the following described
property to wit: the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) which
the said Adams owes to me and upon which the interest is pay-
able monthly and to secure the payment whereof, I hold the note
of the said Adams for \$100.00 dated September 5th 1874 payable
three years after date and secured by a deed of trust on real estate
in the City of Washington D. C. as collateral security. Also the
sum of money due to me by Mrs. Martha Chatham of the City
of Alexandria, Virginia the same being between two and three
hundred dollars for money lent to her by me; Also all my House-
hold and Kitchen furniture and property of every kind and
Character with the exception of one share of stock of the A. S.
W. R. R. Co. and my writing desk; the said property to be held
by the said George R. Adams in trust for the use and benefit
maintenance and support of my daughter Mary A. Carlton Jr.
and during her life the said money to be kept properly invested
and the same whether principal or interest to be paid to my
said Daughter Mary A. Carlton at such time or times and in
such manner or sums as she may require and direct my ob-
ject being to make provision for the support, maintenance and
comfort of my said daughter, And I do hereby authorize and
empower the said George R. Adams to make sale and dispose of
the said Household and Kitchen Furniture or any part thereof,
whenever he may be required to do so by my said daughter Mary
A. Carlton:

Second: I give, devise and bequeath unto my grandson Clinton
Bergett my Writing desk and one share of stock in the Alex^d Sou-
thern Hampshire P. R. Co.

Third: If any portion of the property devised and bequeathed by this
item or section of this my last will and testament shall remain un-
disposed of at the death of my said daughter Mary A. Carlton I do hereby direct
that the same shall be equally divided amongst my four Grand Children
viz: Clinton Bergett, Britannia Ponter, Laura Moore & Dallas Bergett
the interest of the said Britannia and Laura to be for their sole and sepa-
rate use, free from the debts, liabilities or control of their husbands.
Fourth: I hereby direct that the said note of George R. Adams for \$100.00
shall be held by my said daughter Mary A. Carlton as security for the
faithful discharge of his duties as trustee under this my last will and
testament, with the right to the said Adams to withdraw the said note
upon substituting such other security therefor as my said daughter
shall require on the County Court of Alexandria County or shall direct.
Fifth: I do hereby constitute the said George R. Adams and Mary A.
Carlton Executor and Executrix of this my last will and Testament
and do direct that no security shall be required of them or either of
them in their executive bond.
