Your Commissioner of accounts reports to the Court, that on the 13th day of October 1871 Andrew Garrison the Executor, William Thornton, deceased, exhibited to your Commissioner a statement of all the money which he the said Executor had received, or become chargeable with, or had disbursed, from the 1st day of November 1870 to the 24th day of November 1871, together with the vouchers for such disbursements.

That the Commissioner embraced the said Executor in the list of delinquents, whose accounts were before him for settlement, which was posted at the front door of the Court house of said County, on the first day of December 1871, and on the date of this report (few days having elapsed since the said accounts as mentioned in the said list) made up and completed an account of the said Andrew Garrison's administration, as aforesaid; and on the 24th day of November 1871, finds a balance of \$191⁰⁰ due to the said Estate and payable to Andrew Garrison, the said Executor, the said balance being in the will of the said William Thornton, deceased. The account is supported by satisfactory vouchers, and is herewith returned.

I Richard B. Loya of the County of Washington & District of Columbia being in sound mind & health, but knowing the uncertainty of life, make this my last will & testament, namely, For the consideration of the love and affection I have unto my beloved wife Elizabeth Ellen Loya I will and bequeath unto said Elizabeth Ellen, at my death, all my property of which I may die seized, of Real, personal or mixed, wherever situated, or what I might be entitled to, or inherit had I have lived, unto the said Elizabeth Ellen for and during her natural life and at her death to be equally divided among my children Rosalie, Rosina, Richard, Ellen, Emma, Francis, Edward, and Bradford and any others I may have yet unborn, and knowing full well how necessary it is that children should not be independent of their parents, and that they maintain a respectful respect for their Mother, The said Elizabeth Ellen shall have full power to disburse any child or children above named, who may give her just cause so to do— And it is particularly enjoined by me, that my said wife shall not have power to divide or apportion any part of said property hereby bequeathed to any child or children named, before the death of my said wife, but the whole property to be kept in her possession in trust for her support & the support and education of said children, except, and it must be distinctly understood, that in case the said Elizabeth Ellen should again marry (which I hope she will not do) then the whole of said property hereby bequeathed to her, be divided equally between my said named children or such as may be living at the time or times here (my children) as they shall severally arrive to the age of twenty one years, Witness my hand and seal this eighteenth day of June one year of our Lord Eighteen hundred and fifty six—
