In the Name of God Andrew Fitchettone of the
County of Bath & State of Virginia being far advanced
in years but of sound & perfect mind & memory, calling to mind my
mortality do make & constitute this my last will & Testament in manner
following, I commend my soul to God who gave it & my body to
this earth to be decently interred in a Christian manner at the discretion
of my executors in hope of a glorious Resurrection at the last day
with regards to the worldly goods which God has bestowed upon me,
I will & devise them in manner following, In the first place my
will is that all my just and lawful debts shall be faithfully paid, I
also will & bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth Fitchettone all my
moveable estate except what shall be hereafter otherwise disposed of
to her & her heirs forever, I also will & bequeath unto her the
said Elizabeth Fitchettone the plantation on which I now live together
with the location adjoining it for which I have obtained a patent.

Pale the appurtenances belonging to either of them, to her sole use & profit during her natural life, likewise I allow to her the use & profits of another plantation belonging to me in the parishes known by the name of Tuttins spring, in mill creek, with all the appurtenances belonging to it, during her natural life, I also will bequeath to my beloved wife aforsaid the following negroes, viz, Matthew & Hannah & their children & Every other child now & all their increase to her & heir forever, and the I give them entirely into her disposal, to do with them as she pleases with either to free them or retain them in slavery forever, yet I cannot help expressing my confidence in her humanity & tenderness that she will grant them their freedom in some reasonable time after her death, My will also is, that my wife shall have the whole disposal of all my other negroes & the profits arising from them during her natural life, and after her death my desire would is that they shall enjoy their freedom, on condition, that during her life they shall behave towards her in so friendly & dutiful a manner, as to merit her approbation & consent to their freedom, but if otherwise, & she thinks at or before her death, that they or any part of them shall have forfeited their right to freedom such shall be retained in slavery & disposed of as follows, viz, they shall be sold by my executors & the money arising from the sale shall be by them disposed of in the same manner & proportion as the cash & trust & other debts due to the estate herein after to be mentioned shall be distributed, I think it prudent & expedient that none of the males of my slaves shall be set at liberty before they arrive to the age of twenty five years, but that they be bound out by executors or in case of his death by the overseers of the poor for this County, to honest industrious persons of good repute, who may bring them up to habits of industry & morality, & teach them to read & write so as to be able to understand the scriptures & keep their own accounts and that the females shall be bound out in the same manner till they arrive to the age of twenty one years, that they also shall be bound to persons of good repute, who shall bring them up to

read at least 3 to habits of industry & morality so that they may be fitted for being good & useful members of society, My desire is, that my executors or the overseers of the poor, as the case may be shall endeavour to secure for them, that is for those which shall be bound, as much freedom from their masters as may be thought just & reasonable to be given to them, so soon as they shall be free, I also will that in case any of those slaves who shall be above the age of twenty five years at the death of my wife, shall become old & infirm & unable by any accident to support themselves, that the others who shall be free at such a time shall contribute to the comfortable support of such invalids, My will further is that nine hundred pounds out of my movable estate shall be distributed in manner following, Viz, one hundred pounds to Grant Cranford wife of Nathan Cranford, & fifty pounds to Andrew Settington Cranford son of said Nathan Cranford, One hundred pounds to General Sloan & twenty five pounds to her daughter Polly Sloan, fifty pounds to Polly Young wife to John Young, fifty pounds to Squiff Beatty wife to Andrew Beatty, fifty pounds to Elizabeth Kelsay wife to James Kelsay & fifty pounds to her daughter Elizabeth Settington Kelsay, One hundred pounds to my nephew James Erwin & one hundred pounds to my nephew Andrew Erwin, one hundred pounds to my niece Georgi McLaughlin wife to Edward McLaughlin & twenty five pounds to her son Andrew McLaughlin, fifty pounds to Andrew Settington McDonald son of Samuel McDonald, twenty five pounds to Elizabeth McDonald daughter of John McDonald & twenty five pounds to Elizabeth McDonald daughter of Samuel McDonald, these several sums may be paid in money or in trust that may be in my possession at the time of my death, all the remainder of my movable estate, in Cash bonds notes bank accounts mortgages, dues of trust & that shall be in my possession at the time of my death I give entirely to my wife aforsaid to her sole use & profit, My will also is that after my wife decease the plantation on which I now live together with the location adjoining it aforementioned, shall be equally divided as to quantity & quality between Andrew Settington Warlick, son of Jacob Warlick, & Andrew Settington son of Robert Settington to them & their heirs forever, I make & execute

to my beloved wife Elizabeth Sillington my plantation known by the name of Fishers Spring or will Creek to her & to her heirs forever. I will & bequeath to my nephews Andrew Erwin my plantation in Grainger in Bath County known by the name of Wardens place to him & his heirs forever. Also appoint & constitute my wife Elizabeth Sillington & Jacob Warlick of Bath County executors of this my last will & testament. and I do hereby revoke & disannul all other wills & testaments that have heretofore been made by me & declare this alone to be my last will & testament, In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this twelfth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & four.

I know all men by these presents that I John Crockett of the County of Montgomery and State of Kentucky for divers good causes now hereunto necessary do nominate and appoint Robert Crockett of the County and State aforesaid my true and lawful attorney for me and in my name and to my use to sell all my lands in the County of Bath & Rockbridge in the State of Virginia receive payment make due or dues of conveyances for me

and in my name as fully and completely as could or would that I were personally present. Ratifying and confirming whatever my said attorney shall lawfully do concerning the premises. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 28th day of October 1803
