County of Bath and State of Virginia being weak of body but of perfect
mind and memory thanks be unto God calling unto mind the mortal-
ity of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all once to die
do make and Ordain this my last will and Testament that is to say
I do hereby give and Recommend my soul unto the
hands of Almighty God for his good pleasure and mercy
the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion
of my executors nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection
I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God and as
touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to
bless me with in this life, I give devise and dispose of the same in
the following manner and form, first I give and bequeath to my
well beloved son James Demmittie the sum of Ten pounds lawful
money of Virginia also I give to my well beloved daughter Jerry
Wilson the sum of ten pounds also I give to my well beloved daughter

Mary husband the sum of ten pounds. I also give to my well beloved son William
Demmittie whome I likewise constitute make and Ordain the sole executor of
this my last will and Testament, all and singular my real and personal
estate by him freely to be disposed and enjoyed. Ratifying and confirming
this and no other to be my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof I
have hereunto set my hand and seal this twentieth day of December in
the year of our Lord Eighteen hundred and three.

Attest before the signing of this it is my desire that no appointment or sale
be made of my estate after my death.
