In the Name of God amen I Robert Kincaid a single man  
of Batsto County and State of Virginia being sick and  
weak in body but of sound mind and disposing my  
mortality for which I thank God and calling to  
mind the uncertainty of human life and being desirous  
concerning to dispose of all such worldly estate as it  
hath pleased God to bless me with I give and be-  
queath the same in manner following that is to say  
first I leave my funeral charges together with all  
just debts to be paid. And I give and bequeath to my  
wife Phoebe the House I now live in with all that  
land that is on that side of the river that I  
enjoy together with three trees two horses and one

mane and also all the sheep and hogs also two beds with their furniture and all the house and kitchen furnished, but it is my will that my <sup>dear</sup> wife shall only enjoy said land so long as she remains single and unmarried but if she marries it is my will that the said plantation mentioned to her shall be sold and the third amount of said plantation I allow her to have the interest of it during her natural life. I send Salina Richard Cooke to live with my said wife if she keeps unmarried until he is come of age and then to be paid twenty pounds by my executors but if she marry I allow her to be bound to a trade, I send it bequeath to my son Richard's wife all the land he now lives on that side of the river which John Baird formerly enjoyed to him and to his heirs and assigns forever. I send I bequeath to my daughter Margaret Cook ten dollars.

I send I bequeath to my daughter Agnes Scott fifteen pounds. I leave and bequeath to my son John's wife the money field with all the Survey it being twenty five acres to her and her heirs and assigns forever. I leave and bequeath to my daughter Jane Nichols Ten Dollars and to a son of hers named Thomas twenty pounds. Then I bequeath to my grand son Isaac Mayes five pounds. I send I bequeath to my daughter Polly Stoop the one half of my plantation that John Cathcart lives on it being the one I had from my father and the house Salina to be or her devise. I send I bequeath to my son William the other half off <sup>the</sup> plantation to be divided equally in quantity and quality. I leave thus to my daughter Polly Stoop to her and her heirs and assigns forever but my will is that the half off <sup>the</sup> plantation left to my son William is not to be in his power to sell it except my daughter Polly Stoop

or her husband does cause to sell third part and removes off and in consequence of that I allow my said daughter and her husband to sell my son William half and execute adord for the same but by all means let William have the whole amount of his own share but should Dr. Stoop and wife want to sell third part and William want to live on his half in case of that my will is this that he may keep or sell it as he pleases and then I allow it to his heirs and assigns forever. I send Salina Frederick Stoop to pay my son Richard Mayes twenty five pounds one year after my decease out of his share of my upper place. I send I allow my daughter Polly Stoop one good feather bed and its furnished at whatever time this plantation may be sold that I have left to support my wife during her natural life. I allow the money to be equally devolved as it may be got to all my children or their heirs legally authorized to receive it, except it is Margaret Cook I allow her nothing more than what is before mentioned to her. As my son William I allow no more than what is before mentioned nor my Grand son Isaac all these three last mentioned persons is to have in part left of the sale of the plantation. I have mentioned to be sold, and should the legatees I have bequeathed exceed the amount of my personal estate I allow my executors to pay the legatees according to seniority as far as it may go and if any is unpaid of the mentioned legatees at their death until the sale of the plantation is out of the sale of that plantation I allow my Grand daughter Elizabeth Mayes fifteen pounds that is my son Richard's daughter and partly I do hereby constituted and appointor Robert Settington and William Douglas to be executors of this my last will and Testament utterly revoking disannulling all former wills or wills by me made and do acknowledge them to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 31<sup>st</sup> day of Nov<sup>r</sup> in the year of our Lord 1803 signed sealed published and declared as and for the Richard Mayes <sup>Sub</sup> last will and testament of the above named William Goffell
