In the Name of God amen I Richard Mays Sen
of Bath County and State of Virginia being sick and
weak in body but of sound mind and disposing
memory for which I thank God and calling to
mind the uncertainty of human life and being desirous
to dispose of all such worldly estates as it
hath pleased God to bless me with I give and be-
queath the same in manner following that is to say
first I allow my funeral charges together with all
just debts to be paid And I give and bequeath to my
wife Phoebe the House I now live in with all the
land that is on that side of the river that I
enjoy together with these five or hundred and one

man and also all the sheep and hogs also two beds with their furniture and all the house and kitchen furnished, but it is my will that my wife shall only enjoy said land so long as she remains single and unmarried but if she marries it is my will that the said plantation mentioned to her shall be sold and the third amount of said plantation I leave her to have the interest of it during her natural life. Now I leave Richard Cooke to live with my said wife if she keeps unmarried until he is come of age and then to be paid twenty pounds by my executors but if she marry I allow her to be bound to a trade, Now I bequeath to my son Richard Mage, all the land he now lives on on that side of the River which John Baird formerly enjoyed to him and to his heirs and assigns forever. Now I bequeath to my daughter Margaret Cook ten dollars. Now I bequeath to my daughter Agnes Scott fifteen pounds. Now I leave and bequeath to my son John Mage the money field with all the Survey it being twenty five acres to him and to his heirs and assigns forever. Now I leave and bequeath to my daughter Jane Hood Ten Dollars and to one of her named Thomas twenty pounds. Now I bequeath to my Grand son Isaac Mage five pounds. Now I bequeath to my daughter Polly Steep the one half of my plantation that John Cokerias lives on it being the one I had from my father and the house I leave to be in her devise. Now I bequeath to my son William the other half of my plantation to be divided equally in quantity and quality. I leave this to my daughter Polly Steep to her and her heirs and assigns forever but my will is that the half of my plantation left to my son William is not to be sold his power to sell it except my daughter Polly Steep

or her husband sees cause to sell third part and remove off and in consequence of that I leave my said daughter and her husband to sell my son Williams half and execute adred for the same but by all means at Will. I leave the whole amount of his own share but should P. Steep and wife want to sell third part and William want to live on his half in case of that my will is that he may keep or sell it as he pleases and then I leave it to him his heirs and assigns forever. Now I leave Frederick Steep to pay my son Richard Mage twenty five pounds one year after my decease out of his share of my upper place. Now I leave my daughter Polly Steep one good feather bed and its furniture at whatever time this plantation may be sold that I have left to support my wife during her natural life. I leave this money to be equally divided as it may be got to all my children or their heirs legally authorized to receive it except it is Margaret Cook I leave her nothing more than what is before mentioned to her. Now my son William I leave no more than what is before mentioned nor my Grand son Isaac all these three last mentioned persons is to have no part of the sale of the plantation I have mentioned to be sold, and should the legacies I have bequeathed exceed the amount of my personal estate I leave my executors to pay the legacies according to seniority as far as it may go and if any is unpaid of the mentioned legacies at their death until the sale of the plantation and out of the sale of that plantation I leave my Grand daughter Esbald Mage fifteen pounds that is my son Richards daughter and partly I do hereby constitute and appoint Robert Tillingford and William Douglas to be executors of this my last will and Testament attesting Revoking disannulling all former wills or wills by me made and do acknowledge this to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 31st day of Nov^r in the year of our Lord 1803 signed sealed published and declared as and for the last will and testament of the above named Richard Mage in presence of William Griffith
