## The Ohio Company

The second land company of importance—the Ohio Company— was projected in 1748 by Thomas Lee of Westmoreland County, who was a member of the Council and afterwards president of the Council, and acting governor of Virginia. The association was formed to make settlements west of the Alleghenies, and the grant was made by order of Council in March 1749. The land was to include 500,000 acres between the Monongahela and the Kanawha, though a part might go north of the Ohio. Two hundred thousand acres were to be taken immediately. The company was to pay no quitrents for ten years, but was to settle 100 families at once, to build a fort at its own expense, and to maintain a garrison in it for defence against the Indians.

In its more than forty-year existence, the Ohio Company personnel represented the best of Virginia families. The men mentioned in this connection are as follows: Colonel
