day of November in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred. I Amos Nanny
 of the County of Brunswick & Parish of Methuen being sick and weak in body but of
 Perfect Mind and allowing thanks to God therefore willing unto mind the
 Mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed good men Once to die do
 make and Ordain this my last will and Testament that is to say Principally and
 first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it
 and for my body I recommend it to the earth to be buried in a Christian and
 Decent manner at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but at the general
 Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty Power of God. And as
 touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to Bless me with in
 this life I give and dispose of the same in the following Manner and form
 I give and bequeath unto my sons Wm. Nanny and - Hel. Nanny
 a certain piece of land lying on the North side of the Little road containing
 one hundred and four ^{teen} Acres be the same more or less it being a piece that I
 bought of George Johnson to be equally divided Between them Wm. to have the
 lower end likewise I give unto my son Wm. a certain Bay horse likewise one
 feather bed and furniture likewise I give unto my son Abel a certain bay pelfy one feather bed
 and furniture.

Now I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Roberts one feather bed and furniture likewise one cow and calf both which she has never possessed. Now I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Charlotte Williams one feather bed and furniture likewise one cow and calf being the same which she now has in possession. Now I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Pitter one feather bed and furniture likewise one cow and calf. Now I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Susan one feather bed & furniture likewise one cow & calf. Now I give and bequeath to my Daughter Minerva one feather bed and furniture likewise one cow and calf. Now I lend unto my wife the plantation whereon I now live and all my land not here before mentioned during her life or widowhood likewise I lend unto my wife all the real & personal property not heretofore mentioned after my debts and legacies are paid to possess the same during her life or widowhood. Now at the decease of my wife or end of her widowhood I give & bequeath unto my son James & Nancy all my land and property which I have lent my wife & leave as for my Negroes I leave them in following manner I mean if I increase my Negro Wench Paty does have more children so that there is one Negro Child for each of my Children to have one I give them in this manner for my eldest Child to have the eldest Negro Child &c. the oldest Child to take the oldest Negro Child until they have all got one then my Negro wench to belong to my son James & Nancy. In case my Negro wench does not have children enough for each of my Children to have one a piece I lend her and all her Children now to my wife during the life or widowhood of my wife then to be equally divided amongst all my living Children. Likewise constitute make and Ordain my wife my son Matt & Nancy and my son in law Absalom Williams my Executors of this my last will and Testaments. I Witness whose of I have hereunto set my hand & seal this day and year above written.
