Negro Boy Isham and if he the said Wyle Washington die without an
Heir the said Isham to return to my Family. HUM yet it is my will &
desire that the whole of my Estate both real and personal be kept together
during my Loving Maryans Harrisons life in order to pay my Just
Debts and to support my Family and after the Death of my wife
Maryan Harrison to be equally divided between all my Children
(to wit) Robert Harrison, Wyle Harrison, James Harrison, Polly Harrison
Savoni Harrison, Carter Harrison, Benjamin Harrison and William
Cole Harrison, to them their Heirs and assigns forever And I do appoint
Robert Harrison Wyle Harrison and James Harrison whole & Sole
Executors of this my last Will and Testament revoking & annulling
all other Wills heretofore made In Witness whereof I have here-
tofore set my Hand & affixt my Seal this Twenty first day of October

Hampshire County Court Jan^y 25th 1796

This last Will and Testament of James Harrison dec^d
was proved by the Oaths of William Stainback and Rebecca Mistle two
of the Witnesses thereto Vouched to be recorded & on the Motion of Robert &
Wille Harrison two of the Executors therein named they having made
Oath thereto according to Law and together with Charles Cordle &
Thomas Washington their Securities entered into and Acknowledged
a bond in the penalty Ten Thousand pounds with Condition
as the Law directs but if the same is granted them for obtaining a probate
thereof in due form & being proved the then said Ten in the said
Court when he shall be called upon.

This is to certify that Darks Harwell being very sick in body, but of sound mind and memory did openly say, in presence of Charles Otthins & Archibald Parkinson, that it was her will and desire that as James Smith of Brunsvorch had her son Mark Harwell bound to him by the said Darks Harwell sometime ago that it was her will & Desire that the hole of her Estate should by put in the care of the said James Smith to dispose of agreeable to Law & the Money arising from such Sales & all the Money that may be owing to the said Darks Harwell should be put out to Interest agreeable to Law for the benefit of the said Mark Harwell and his Heirs ever he the said Mark Harwell her only Son should live to the years Twenty one & that he the said James Smith should be appointed Guardian for the said Mark Harwell by the Court.

The said Darks Harwell departed this life on Saturday 23rd January One Thousand Seven Hundred & Ninety six
