Kitchen furniture it is my will & desire that the remaining property be
kept together & should out and the same rented and the money arising
from such hire or rent to be put to the use & support of the said four
children till the said Swelling becomes of Lawful age then it is my
will & desire is that the remaining property be equally divided between
Martha Williams, Swelling Williams, Theophilus Harrison Williams, & John
Williams son of Anderson Williams to them & their heirs forever I constitute
and appoint Peter Williams & Swelling Williams executors to this my last
will & Testament
