I John Watson of the County of Brunswick and State of Virginia do constitute and ordain this as my last Will and Testament, and do dispose of my worldly goods in the following manner First I give to my beloved wife Suerelia one Feather Bed Furniture one Horse one Cow Hair and to have her choice of these Articles half a dozen pewter plates two pewter Dishes to her and her Heirs forever -  
Secondly. I desire that my household Utensils may be annulled either out privately or publicly by my Executors untill my son James arrives to the age of Twenty one Years and the profits arising from his Heir to be applied to the Support & Education of my Children. Thirdly. I lend to my beloved wife all my Lands, Slaves and stock of every kind with all my Tools, Furniture and every thing else that is not before disposed of during her natural Life or Widowhood and after the decease of my beloved wife or when she marries another Man I desire that all my Estate not before given may be equally divided between my Children except my Land which I give wholly to my Son James. To them & their Heirs for  
Fourthly. I appoint my beloved wife Suerelia Watson to execute this my last Will and Testament the fourteenth Day of Sept 1794
