 pleased God to bless me with to give & bequeath the same in manner following
 that is to say I do give & bequeath my wife Mary Hite & her heirs & assigns

and all my stock of cattle which is not herein after mentioned I then stand to my said wife Lucy the use of Land whereon I now live during her natural life and after her decease to be sold and the money arising therefrom to be equally divided between all my children except Anna Burton one half of whose share I give to Patsy C. Mitchell. I then I also leave to my said wife Lucy all my personal and portable estate that is not herein otherwise disposed of, for and during the term of her natural life and after her decease to be equally divided between all my children except my Daughter Anna Burton one half of whose share I give to my Grand daughter Patsy C. Mitchell to be enjoyed by them and their heirs forever. I then my will is that my Real estate all my stock of Horses not herein after mentioned also my still and whatever household furniture and portable property as my said wife shall think proper to spare. I then I leave one negro man by the name of John to be sold and the money arising from such sale to be equally divided between my two sons Benjamin & Marcus. I then I give to my son Robert Rogers and Patsy two rows and calves four cows. I then I give to my son Marcus Will two rows and calves and four cows. I then I give to my son Clement Ephraim two rows and furniture two cows & calves and four cows. I then all the rest of my estate both real and personal of what nature or kind soever it may be not herein before particularly disposed of I desire may be equally divided among all my children which I give to them their heirs Executors Administrators and assigns forever. And Lastly I do appoint my son Robert Mitchell executor of this my last Will and Testament. hereby revoking all other and former Wills or Testaments by me heretofore made In Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 15th day of October in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and three
