
Edward Robinson In the name of GOD AMEN. I Edward Robinson do  
make & ordain this my last will & testament in manner & form following  
that is to say. Item. 1<sup>st</sup> I give & bequeath unto my beloved wife  
Rebecca Robinson and to her heirs & executors one third part of all my  
goods no value with privilege of making choice of such as  
she may think proper not exceeding two hundred in value. I  
also give her my Riding Chair & horse suitable for a bairn him  
with a small pannier as will be sufficient for her support until  
she can make one horse after my death and I bind her my said  
wife all my household and kitchen furniture until my daughter  
Elizabeth & her husband have come of age to take same I

give her the said Mary C. Robinson one equal third part of said  
furniture and when my son John H. Robinson shall come of age I give  
the said John one other third part of said furniture & the remaining  
third part I give & bequeath to my beloved wife In the next place  
it is my will I desire all my just debts be paid by making sale  
of that part of my remaining Estate as my executors hereafter mentioned  
shall think best to best provide for that purpose. Here I give and  
bequeath all money part of my estate both Real & Personal not otherwise  
designed to my two Children namely Mary C. Robinson & John H.  
Robinson to be kept together for their mutual support until my son's  
Daughter Mary shall come of age or Mary and him to be equally  
visitors between them and us that marriage shall be dissolved  
in a proper season and lastly I give to my said wife Elizabeth  
Robinson my executors to John Robinson my executor to the west  
will & testament & also of all others by me made as witness my hand &  
Seal this 2<sup>d</sup> day of May 1812.

there came to his wife wife with this according to law & agreement with  
Henry Robinson & his wife Elizabeth the wife has several debts acknowledged  
a debt in the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (which is the sum) to which  
certificate is granted here for obtaining a probate thereof as soon as may  
be given by the new Bank. There comes to you in the sum of which  
she may think fit York
