In the name of God Amen

I George Malone of Bunsurwick County and Helthrop Virginia being in a
body but in perfect mind and memory do make and ordain this my last
Will & Testament in manner & form to wit:
I stand unto my beloved wife Lucy Malone during her widow hood or till
she will and all the land I hold in the County of Bunsurwick and all her
marriage or death my will is that the said ~~land~~ and land shall be
sold by my Executors hereafter named in such manner as they shall
deem most advantageous and my sd Executors are hereby authorized to convey
the same in fee simple to ~~the~~ purchaser or purchasers and the money
arising from such sale to be equally divided between my six youngest sons
(to wit) Broth John George William Robert James Malone to them
& to their heirs forever. I also lend to my beloved wife Lucy Malone during
her widowhood or till the following property viz: six negroes namely
Absalom Seham Jerry Lucy Dora & Sam. four feather beds & furniture
four cows and Calves a young spoke of steers the Cart or wheel three Cows and
and pigs one thousand pounds of Good fresh Pork twenty four
lamb twelve head of arse two head of horse namely the two mare former
a bay horse called Davis one black with two white and halfof of her three one
dutch oven three pigs one frying pan two tubs & two plates my best set of
knives and forks two flat Irons and Craft and hand saws, one drawing knife
two red pine boxes two narrow axes one broad ax three brooms three hells
hats two Girdling hoes all my chests & chairs and Walnut table all my pewter &
earthen ware three hundred pounds of seed cotton all my cotton and three
spinning wheels my best glass wheel my grindstone her riding saddle & bridle
I then I give unto each of my sons a negro which I have before sent them I give
to David Malone I give a negro boy named Ben. To William Malone I give a negro
boy named Ascher. To Broth Malone I give a negro boy named Sam. To John Malone
a negro boy named Ned. To George Malone I give a negro boy named Abraham. To
William Malone I give a negro boy named Billy. To Robert Malone I give
a negro boy named Dick. To James Malone I give a negro man named
Ben and as to my son Broth Malone my will is that he shall have his choice
to return unto my estate a negro Girl named Fanny which I lent him or pay
into my estate fifty good pounds Virginia Money & keep said negro & his
master. And I do give to each and every of my sons all the other property not
above named which I have before sent them. I then to my daughter Elizabeth
I give a negro and her little negro woman named Polly and all her increase

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to her and to her heirs forever. I then to my daughter Wilmoth Hutchinson I send a negro woman named Betty and all her increase during her life and her husband Richard Hutchinson's natural life and then to be equally divided among all the children of my daughter Wilmoth Hutchinson to my daughter Sally Bugg Spive & together to a negro woman named Hannah and all her increase to her and her heirs forever. I then the children of my daughter Mary Vaughan Spive and beneath a negro woman named Gilly and all her increase to be equally divided among them. I then to the children of my daughter Patsy Sanier Spive & together to a negro woman named Lucy and all her increase to be equally divided among them = I then to my daughter Anne Edmund Spive one mare & one bed and furniture which I have heretofore lent her. I then at my wife's marriage or death my will is that all the property which I have lent her the land and dwell excepted shall be divided among my children in the following manner (to wit) That each and every of my sons shall receive each one equal part & to my daughter Elizabeth Sanier & her sister Bugg shall receive one equal part and that my daughter Wilmoth Hutchinson shall receive one equal part as lent to her viz her husband Richard Hutchinson during their natural lives & then to be divided equally among all my daughter Wilmoth's children and that the children of Anne Edmund Spive Vaughan and Patsy Sanier shall receive each her or their mother's equal proportionable part - I then I will and desire that all my property of every description except that part lent to my wife and the property that have heretofore been lent to my children in this will shall be divided among my children in the following manner Viz To each of every of my sons Spive an equal part to my daughter Elizabeth Sanier & Sally Bugg Spive one equal part and to my daughter Wilmoth & Hutchinson I send one equal part during her natural life and her husband's natural life and then to be equally divided among all my daughter Wilmoth's children. I then to the children of Anne Edmund Spive Vaughan & Patsy Sanier Spive to each her or their mother's proportionable part of my property - I then I will and desire that if any dispute shall arise between my children respecting my Division of my estate that the same shall be left to three men to be appointed by the Court of Brunswick County and their decision shall be binding on each party - Lastly I appoint my son James Malone & my son in law John Bugg my Executors to this my last Will & Testament revoking and annulling all former wills by me made In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirteenth day of August eighteen hundred and ten
