This last Will & Testament of Stephen Jones dec'd was proved
by the Oaths of Joseph Maclin & Dorville Thompson two of the
Justices thereof and ordered to be recorded and on the motion

of Robert Jones & Robert Blackwell the executors therein named they having made
Oath thereto and together with Joseph Maclin & Dorville Thompson their securities
entered into & acknowledged a bond in the penalty of six thousand pounds with Sureties
as the law directs Certificate is granted them for a probate thereof in due form

In the name of God amen I John Johnson being sick
& weak in body but yet of perfect sense & memory thanks to Almighty God for
& as life is uncertain & death is certain do make a final will & devise this
my last Will & testament declaring all former Wills made by me that I do leave
my body to be decently buried & my soul to be committed into the hands of Almighty
God who gave it & as to my worldly estate I do give & bequeath in the following
manner, to wit, I do devise with full power to be laid down I do give unto
my daughter Lucy Walker one Negro boy named Clark to hold her & her heirs
I do give unto my grandson Mason Vanderwood one Negro girl named Malley
to him & his heirs forever I do give unto my Daughter Ann Parrace one
Negro Girl named Mott to hold & her heirs forever I do give unto my
son Abraham Johnson one Negro boy named Ruthers one Red & self one further
Red Furniture to him & his heirs forever I do give unto my beloved wife
Penny Johnson all the rest of my estate consisting of lands, plantations, plantation
Utensils, all household & kitchen furniture also the remains of my Negroes namely
Dolly, Ann, Richard, Betty, Francis, Charles, Charlotte, Peter, Samuel & Elizabeth
Smiths tools & all kinds of Stocks, Clothes, Cars, Whips & Bells to be her during life
in Birmingham & at the death or marriage of my wife or my wife's death I do give
that Dolly should live with which of my Children she pleases I do give at the
death or marriage of my wife I give to my Daughter Lucy Westcott one
Negro Girl named Clark to hold her & her heirs forever I do give at which time I give
to my wife Ann Johnson one Negro boy named Peter to hold her & her heirs forever

One Negro boy by name Joseph to him & his heirs forever then and at the same
 time I do give to my son Abraham One Negro Girl named Charlotte, also all my land
 the of my property not disposed of to be equally divided between my daughter Lucy
 Walford, Jane Harrison, Abraham Johnson, my son grandsons Henry Miles Sampson
 & Mason Sampson to have a fourth part of this property to be equally divided between
 them. I do appoint executo^rs & ordain my beloved wife Fanny Johnson my executor &
 Benjamin Johnson Sen^r & William Fuller executor to this my last Will & Testament
 Given under my hand & seal this 15th day of March in the ninth year of George
 the 3rd
