In the name of God AMEN I Joseph Phipps
of Brunswick County being in reasonable Health and of sound mind
and memory calling to mind the uncertainty of life do make and
ordain this my last Will and Testament. - First I command my soul
into the hands of God and my Body to the rest to be buried at the
disposition of my Friends: and as to my worldly estate my will and
desire is as following vizt I give and bequeath to my Son John
Phipps the plantation wherein I now live one Negro man named Peter
two beds and Furniture. Four Head of Horsing Two Cows and Calves
Two Horses, and one yoke of Slaves, all my Stock of Hogs, all my
Plantation tools, and all my Household and Kitchen Furniture that
is not hereafter otherwise disposed of to him & his heirs forever.
I give and bequeath to my Grandson John Manning ^{the} House coll
two years old next August, to him & his Heirs forever
I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Sabby Manning one
Feather Bed and Furniture and One Cow and Calf to her and her
heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Mary Wrensey
Twenty five pounds cash to be paid by Executor to her & her heirs forever
My Will and desire is that out of the remainder of my estate
my just debts be paid and the balance of them be equally divided
between my two Sons, Benjamin Phipps and John Phipps Lastly I
appoint my Son John Phipps my sole Executor to this my last will
& Testament. Given under my Hand and Seal this Twenty first
day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and
