 will & papers heretofore and lastly I constitute my said wife Rebecca
 Robinson my executor & John Robinson my executor to the next best
 will & testament touching all others by me made as Witness my hand &
 seal this 27 day of May 1812

 that it is appointed for all persons once to die do hereby dispose of my
 property as followeth. in the first place I give & bequeath unto my beloved

of the property left to me and my dear natural Sister by my mother
 Bridget to them & their heirs forever. I have then with my ~~brother~~ ^{brother} Frederick
 Bridget the following property to wit, one negro Man named Peter
 one course young one Girl named Nancy One course named ~~Cherry~~
 and also Children Betty Henry & Mary. Also all my household furniture
 to be kept by my brother Frederick Bridget or disposed off, as my dear
 he may think best by sale or otherwise but it is my desire that the
 negroes shall not be hired out the property here in manner which I
 have sent to my ^{brother} Frederick Bridget, I give Leguath unto my niece
 Elizabeth Bridget Daughter of my brother William Bridget secured
 whenever she comes of age or Marry with the future In case of
 the negroes and if my said niece dies before she comes of age or marries
 my will and desire is and I do hereby give & bequeath the same property
 which I have given to my said niece to my brother Frederick
 Bridget to him & his heirs forever as if my brother Frederick
 should die before my said niece. My dear Cases of age or Marry I
 have desire that the negroes become manumitted to be sold and the
 Money put out on Interest for the benefit of my said niece
 I appoint my brother Frederick Bridget executor of this my last
 Will and Testament making null and void all other Wills hereto made
 by me. In testimony whereof I have signed this my last Will
 this 16th day of December Eighteen hundred & Thirteen
